28th March - 2nd April 10am – 6pm

Anyone that experienced Colourscape during last year's Stroud Fringe Festival will have enjoyed the intense experience of colour and music together. Now the Eye Music Trust and Stroud Council present a new installation - an experience of colour and music that you create yourself!

For six days the Colour/Music Sensory Space will be installed in the Subscription Rooms to be open to the public and to Special Needs groups. Organised in conjunction with Autism Awareness Week people on the Autistic Spectrum have a particularly strong reaction intense colour and music.

Within a warm, surrounding environment there are special movement sensors that you can 'play' with your hands, feet or head to create all kinds of music. The sensors also control and mix coloured LED lights so that you can create all the colours of the rainbow linked to the music.

Each day there will be closed sessions for people with ASD but also public sessions where anyone can come and enjoy the experience and become a concert pianist, African drummer or rock musician just with the movement of your hands or feet.

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
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
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

I've included a few of the tracks they played throughout the evening. I thought it would be nice if you, the reader, listened to them while you read the article. But then I realised that you'd have to read incredibly slowly in order for that to actually work. So they've kindly put a podcast of them together for you to enjoy at your leisure.



1. Fela Kuti Water No Get Enemy

We spent the evening in the newly re-opened Golden Fleece, the venue was important not only because it was where they first played one of their Stroud gigs 16 years ago, but they will also be returning there to begin a new monthly residency on the 26th March.



2. Jstar No diggity (Diwali Love)

As we set up record players and drink pints we mused on the number of DJs in Stroud, surely there has to be more here than the average town of this size? We all agree that Stroud has more DJs, more music enthusiasts, and the audience has a broader music knowledge than anywhere else they've experienced.



3. Mr Blennd Mash up of Fred Weslev's 'House Party' and Lady Sovereign's 'Random'

You will definitely have heard Will or Tom DJ at some point in the nearly two decades they've been entertaining the people of Stroud. Whether at one of the many gigs they have played around town, their show on Stroud FM, their podcasts, or during their spectacular stint managing the Block Party Stage over last year's Stroud Fringe weekend. They're prolific, with sets wide-ranging in the eras and genres that they cross.



4. Hackney Colliery Band Africa

Their Stroud Calling podcasts are popular and have reached audience figures of up to 7,000, all over the world. At one point they were more popular in Brazil than they were in Stroud. But the Block Party at the Stroud Fringe festival was a real affirmation; it allowed them to bring the vision of what they wanted to bring to Stroud to a much wider audience.



5. Ramsev Lewis Les Fleur

I'm not surprised to learn that they've known each other for over two decades, since they met at Tom's 16th birthday party over 25 years ago (where apparently there was a dance off to Vanilla Ice). Since then, they've played in London, Liverpool, Bristol ... the Forest of Dean. They've played sets hats and coats in venues with no heating and snow falling outside, whilst the dancer's visible breath filled the room. I'm amazed by their obsession. it seems almost touching on insanity to me. A music-inspired madness, what could be better?



6. Johnny Wakelin In 7aire

They confirm my suspicions; between the two of them they own nearly 10,000 records. They'll regularly visit local record shops (a big shout to Trading Post Records in Stroud, they recognise a kindred spirit in the wonderful Simon Vincent), when friends of theirs go on holiday they are sent with a list and an address of a record shop. Will even has an app which tells him where the nearest record shop is. In terms of a vice, it's a pretty good one.



Burro (Marrichi band version)

They cite many influencers that you and I will be familiar with: Norman Jav. Gilles Peterson. Jon Carter, Afrika Bambaataa, Andy Smith. That's why their nights have been so popular, they play tracks which we all love, sometimes re-edits. sometimes covers, interwoven with tracks which we've never heard before. Those decades spent in record shops has given them such an in-depth knowledge of music, they've done all of the hard work so we can reap the rewards.

They're tastes and collections are different, they often start with their own sets, increasing the pace to three records each, by the end of the evening they can often be found fighting each other over the decks. The measure of a tracks success? If people are smiling and dancing.



8. The Supremes Up the Ladder to the Roof

What can you expect from their new monthly residency at the Golden Fleece? They want to share their music with as many people as possible - entertain and educate. Neither of them are particularly gregarious, its not about them being on on stage and the centre of attention, although Tom has been known to punch the air from time to time. Most importantly, they want people to have a good time, they both love to throw a party.



Le Freak

How would I sum up my evening with the boys? Fun, filled with humour and overwhelmingly eniovable. And that's what you can expect to experience too.

HATTIE BRIGGS

FROM A SHEPHERD'S HUT IN THE COTSWOLDS TO MAKING MUSICAL TRACKS ON EUROPEAN GROUND, I CAUGHT UP WITH HATTIE BRIGGS ABOUT THE ROAD TO PRODUCING HER SECOND ALBUM...

The first time I met Hattie Briggs was three years ago at Stroud FM in the run up to the release of her debut EP My Shepherd's Hut. I was presenting the Saturday morning show Teacakes and Talk and she was a student at Oxford University studying Russian but a keen musician who, even then, defined what exports from Stroud ooze determination, raw musical talent, and an earthy quality that you could tell comes from the roots of our dear town. The following year Hattie took a ballsy gamble and in her second year of studying sacked in her degree for her musical desire, and oh boy it paid off. Fast forward to the dawn of 2016 and she's had airplay on BBC Radio 1, 2, 6 Music, Sky Arts, played 100 gigs in 2015, embarked on her first European tour, was a finalist in the BBC Radio 2 Young Folk Awards and released her debut album Red & Gold - which featured a version of Eva Cassidy's Fields Of Gold produced by Eva's brother Dan Cassidy.

When we spoke on the phone to talk about the second album it was like speaking to an old - a welcome hello, warmth, feeling at ease and words that lift your spirits. Reflecting on the first album before delving into details about her latest labour of love and musical letter to her listeners, did Hattie think that her debut album would be such a success? "I'm so happy with how it's gone, people have really connected to it. I'm thrilled with the reaction and still selling copies after copies at gigs," she says whole heartedly.

With her first album standing the test of time, it was time for Hattie to write album number two an audio journal of her journey over the last couple of years from pen to paper to piano and guitar pick. "I went through a prolific stage last year. My song writing has improved a lot and moved on from the first album. Having toured the last

album and cracked the art of touring, it was an important year because it was after the BBC Radio 2 Young Folk awards and I had to keep up helping. It was also a great year for increasing my fan base. Now is the time I want to make a big step forward and head into the mainstream."

That said, stepping into the recording studio once "We know what we're doing now, we've been doing so many pre-production sessions and had time to think about it that the whole process is so much more relaxed and we know what we want." she says. Working with Pete Waterman for the past they like and others have commissioned a song two years who has produced for the likes of Jack Savoretti and Steve Levine, Hattie speaks fondly of her right hand man: "It's been the best, he is iust one of the family and we all get on so well and make a brilliant team, having a laugh while doing all the serious stuff." The team, made up of the likes of guitarist Henry Fraser, cellists Asha McCarthy, Barney Morse-Brown and Jasmine Scott, along with percussionists Stuart Lawson and Barney Whittaker, has taken Hattie's sound and musical ideas to a whole other level through the past couple of years, enlisting them through musical contacts along the way.

The full band are in place for the next season of touring, ready for the launch of the EP in March and the release of Hattie's second album Young Runaway in the summer, with the process of course starting where it all began in Stroud. "Stroud is my home. This is where it all started and this is where the fan base began and where people saw me busking on the streets," she says speaking ahead of her EP launch gig at The Sub Rooms a place she says in itself has become a second home with the venue welcoming her time and time again.

As many fans not just in the UK but internationally are eagerly awaiting the second album, what can we expect from it? "It's a step up from last time, with an epic and rich sounding string arrangement. Definitely a more positive upbeat Hattie with intense power ballads mixed with added pizzazz from a pedal steel guitar and a lot more percussion

driven," she exquisitely describes. It's thanks to Hattie's fans that the album is in production with over 150 pre-album orders and investments of near £5,000 made through crowd funding. "It's been a very successful crowd-funding effort. I want to make the best album possible so it's been a great help and it's an overwhelming experience knowing that people are that keen to listen to new material."

Speaking of new material one of the pledges Hattie promised to the right buyer was a personalised song. Inquisitive about this prospect I asked with a name change, or something quite the opposite? "Some have asked me to record a cover written about a certain topic. But the most special build a song around her words. Now that's a new experience for me." As new experiences are part of the building blocks for Hattie's second album 'Young Runaway' - inspired by one of her biggest inspirations James Taylor - what does the album mean for Hattie? "A lot of the songs are about making decisions to push forward with music quitting university, getting on the road, etc."

As the road for the new album starts in Stroud at the launch of her limited edition EP at the Subscription Rooms on March 26th, what message does Hattie have for the Cotswold community? "I'm hugely grateful for all of the support I've had from Stroud and the surrounding area. I hope that people love this album as much as they did with the first album and I hope that the launch gig at the Sub Rooms is going to be really special and something to remember."










MARCH 2016 WILL SEE THE IMPRESS 'No one had put on a month-long printing festival PRINTMAKING FESTIVAL, AN **INCREDIBLE MONTH-LONG SERIES** OF EXHIBITIONS, MASTER CLASSES, TALKS, MUSIC AND POETRY, ARRIVING IN GLOUCESTERSHIRE FOR THE FOURTH TIME. I MEET WITH FESTIVAL DIRECTOR TRICIA HENRY AT THE GLOUCESTERSHIRE PRINTMAKING STUDIOS TO FIND OUT MORE ABOUT HOW THE **EVENTS WILL UNFOLD.**

'You have to go back a step further, to the start of GPC,' Tricia explains when I ask how the festival came about. The story begins in 2005 when a group of Gloucestershire printmakers, desiring shared facilities and a space to create locally, began contributors evinces the GPC's shared gratitude the Gloucestershire Printmaking Cooperative. Four years later, having settled into their bright, open studios in Griffin Mill, the GPC were looking for a way to progress: to put their cooperative on the map, to increase public awareness of what fine art printing is about and if possible to raise funds to improve the facilities

before,' Tricia reveals. And so in 2009 the GPC initiated the Impress Festival, to great success. By the time the third festival came around, in 2013, the GPC had drawn in an astounding range of international printers, including Hughie O'Donoghue, Antonio Romoleroux from Ecuador and He Kun from China. The standard of artists involved speaks volumes for what our town and the wider Gloucestershire community are able to achieve. Even O'Donoghue was astonished. having had 'no idea that such high calibre art could be found outside major centres'. The upcoming festival, held in over 20 galleries and venues across Gloucestershire, looks set to be just as exceptional.

This year, the festival is loosely themed under the premise of 'process', reflecting the multifaceted process of printmaking itself. Tricia begins to elaborate on the multitude of exhibitions involved, and her desire to acknowledge all the toward those helping make Impress such an inspirational occasion. I am staggered by both the GPC's commitment and the level of participants the festival has drawn in. 'A lot of people don't know who printmakers are', Tricia tells me. 'Yet these are some of the best artists in the world.' Among the events, Jason Hicklin will

be showcasing a set of atmospheric, deeply-etched exhibitions in public locations, such as Gloucester prints produced during a four month period walking and Cheltenham hospitals, is further testament the Orkney Islands in winter. Stroud's Museum in the Park will house a series of prints from Peter Blake's 'Under Milk Wood' collection, as well as an exhibition showcasing the work of master printers from China's Hunan province, concerned with social change, philosophy and spirituality. (The Museum is holding special late night openings on Wednesday evenings for those who can't get there during the day.) Coming from the opposite side of the world, Manhattan Graphics, a collective from New York, will exhibit some of their finest work in Cirencester's Corinium Museum.

One of the most exciting exhibitions for the GPC is their own show of work, entitled 'Pilgrimage', to be displayed in the cloisters of Gloucester Cathedral. In a stunning location, the exhibition promises to be a highlight of the month, and a proud moment for GPC members who have worked so hard to see the festival come to fruition.

Though the standard of artists involved is remarkable, it is by no means an indication of the festival's exclusivity. Bar a few masterclasses and special events, the festival is free, and encouraging public participation across all age groups is central to the ethos of the festival. The decision to place

to the GPC's desire to make art public. Such locations enable people to access artwork through their day to day experiences; to stop for a moment, and, hopefully, to feel that art can have a positive impact on their lives.

For those wishing to get involved, a plethora of interactive workshops, poetry and music events are interspersed throughout the month: there is chance for the whole family to join in on the 20th March with a day of card and printmaking to mark the arrival of spring. Deepspaceworks are hosting an evening of experimental music with Cheltenham University's Xposed Club and, toward the end of the festival, a night of poetry about art with the celebrated poetry club The New Bohemians. Full listings can be found in the festival's programme, and events will be updated throughout the festival, so keep an eye on the website for last minute additions.

Back at home, as I study the beautifully curated catalogue from the 2013 festival, I am drawn to thinking about how any creative outlet - music, art. literature - should be seen as a form of inclusive communication; something to share and be shared. Through this festival, GPC (working collectively

from a shared space) are giving people a unique chance to share - to look, gain insight, develop understanding and share in an art form that can often be misunderstood by the public. Before I left the GPC studios, I asked if Tricia had anything else to add. She didn't hesitate: 'One thing about printmaking is its magic; ink does its own thing,' she says. 'There is a real alchemy that goes on, everyone who prints says that. It's the magic of it that I want people to feel'.

THE BANKS OF THE RIVER SEVERN MAY NOT BE THE MOST

IMMIGRATION, BUT THEN LOCAL DIRECTOR DAVID PEARSON

I MET UP WITH THE BAFTA-NOMINATED FILM DIRECTOR TO

DISCUSS BLACK CAR HOME - DAVID'S HUGELY ENGAGING

AND TANTALISING SHORT FILM EXAMINING IMMIGRATION,

OBVIOUS CHOICE FOR A DARKLY COMIC TALE ABOUT

DOESN'T COME ACROSS AS YOUR AVERAGE JOE EITHER.

For a long time I've felt that it would be great to do more films in Gloucestershire. I've lived here for 20 years and I wanted to demonstrate what you can do in this diverse and striking landscape. The idea for the film came from a cycling trip a friend and I did following the River Severn from the mouth to its source. Along the way we had some hilarious and memorable encounters with all sorts of people. That gave me the idea of setting the film by the banks of the Severn, although I had originally come up with the concept for the film whilst in Columbia.

WHAT IT WAS LIKE FILMING IT?

The film was made a on a wing and a prayer to be honest. There are a lot of talented people who worked on it, and the whole thing involved about 120 people on a shoestring budget of £20,000. We had everyone lined up for five days shooting in the middle of February but then disaster struck. Jon Cleeve -frontman of the gold album-winning band, sea-shantying Fisherman's Friends - agreed to play the lead male character, but a few days before we were due to start shooting the band was involved in a horrendous accident after a gig in Guildford. A stage door fell on them, killing the Tour Manager - who was one of Jon's best friends - and another person. Jon was determined to still do the film and to take his mind off the tragedy, but we now only had four days instead of the already tight five day slot. In a funny way Jon's state of mind mirrored his character's who was still in mourning from losing his wife.

AND WHAT'S THE PUBLIC REACTION BEEN LIKE TO THE FILM?

The first screening of the film was at the Watershed in Bristol, and was a very emotional occasion. The film was shown in six UK cinemas and at the London Short Film festival. I want to make a longer film and that's the main focus now. It would be essentially the same storyline. We had an exit questionnaire from the showings and people strongly wanted to know what happens next.

WHY DO YOU THINK PEOPLE FOUND THE FILM SO ENGAGING?

For me the film is about unlikely friendships, an impetus that comes from meeting all sorts of weird and wonderful people. What a lot of people found interesting was that the friendship between the two main characters doesn't pan out into a romance. A short film can also lend itself to lots of unanswered questions.

MIGRATION IS A POLITICAL HOT POTATO AT THE MOMENT, WHAT ARE YOUR VIEWS ON HOW WE'RE DEALING WITH IT AS A COUNTRY AND INDIVIDUALS?

Well I have an overriding sense that we're not doing enough, but it's not a simple situation. What concerns me is that I don't hear politicians talking about resolving the issues caused by mass migration. Everyone can see what's happening and it's only going to increase. Unless we reduce inequality amongst states it's only going to get worse. Completely opening the gates won't help either. The thing that is extraordinary is that no-one saw this coming.

AND WHAT ARE YOU WORKING ON AT THE MOMENT?

I've always got a whole load of stuff on the go. I'm in the middle of a long-term documentary on political reform, inspired by Stroud's Richard Wilson who has been signing up MPs to commit to new reforms. I've got a thriller set in Canada which I'm looking to get off the ground, and an ongoing documentary series called 'Change of Sex' which I'm hoping the BBC are

HOW DO YOU FIND LIVING IN STROUD AND GLOUCESTERSHIRE? IS IT IMPORTANT TO YOUR FILM-MAKING WORK?

I love the diversity and creative nature of the town. I feel very privileged to live here. There is a particular sort of attitude to life here that I enjoy. It has a great sense of place. I think there can be a tendency on screen for the Cotswolds to be shown through a chocolate box prism - a place quintessentially English but I'm far more interested in the other side

THE STROUD FILM FESTIVAL IS BACK AND THE EVENT KICKS OFF AT THE GOODS SHED WITH THE OSCAR WINNING DOCUMENTARY 20 FEET FROM STARDOM (DIR. MORGAN NEVILLE), AN ENERGETIC, ENERGIZING DOCUMENTARY ON WHAT IT IS TRULY LIKE TO BE A BACKING SINGER.

IT FEATURES PRETTY MUCH ANYONE WHO IS ANYONE IN ROCK 'N ROLL FROM THE BOSS TO THE DIVINE MISS M AND IS A ROUSING START TO THE SECOND STROUD FILM FESTIVAL, WHICH THIS YEAR RUNS FROM THE 4TH TO 20TH MARCH IN VENUES ALL OVER STROUD.

'Music and creativity' is the theme this year and Andy Freedman, program director, is keen to expand on that theme as music is what makes the festival so unique. The festival caters for all tastes, from mainstream to experimental; and all ages from children to adults. "In a world of Netflix and the like" says Andy Freedman, "we are going for the communal experience and the big screen." So, if you missed Michael Fassbender in Macbeth then it's on at Lansdown and if it's a while since you have seen Night at the Museum, then there's a screening with a difference at the Sub Rooms, where staff from the Stroud Museum will be on hand to offer an exclusive look at some of the museum's artefacts.

Fellow organiser Jo Bousfield is also keen to build on the festival's success, she remembers that last year "there was such a fun focus. suddenly you're thinking about film and you're meeting people and it's a social thing. There were a lot of good conversations going on last year." In that spirit The Prince Albert is showing Sex 'n Drugs 'n Rock n 'Roll, starring Andy Serkis as Ian Dury, and Bowie's Ziggy Stardust and the Spiders from Mars. In true Prince Albert tradition, before Ziggy, there will be a chance to offer tributes to Bowie through poetry and prose. Imagine, the story of John Lennon will be screened at the Sub Rooms followed by a live performance from the All You Need Is Beatles tribute band. Casablanca gets an afternoon showing at the same venue as will the delightful children's French animation A Cat in Paris.

No film festival is complete without short films so there will be a reprise of Film London's London Calling event, where local winner, Claire Levy will talk about her film Across Still Water and two other winners will be on hand for that session. Underwater Shorts features films from Stroud Scuba club, who have been filming the

secrets of our coastal waters, while Watermark is presented by Transition Stroud and takes the water theme worldwide.

The festival also sees the return of The Best Local Film Awards by Stroud Community TV. Awards organiser Phillip Booth, says "This will be our fourth year of Stroud CommunityTV Awards; they are all about films that celebrate the creativity and diversity of Stroud. The films are nominated by the public then voted on by a panel of local judges that include a BAFTA nomination, the previous head of a media department, a BBC producer and locals with enthusiasm and interest in film. We have our Awards evening on 9th March at the Crown and Sceptre as part of the festival. During the evening we will be showing 15 local films including winners of the Awards and we will hear from some of the people involved in making those films" SCTV has received over 2000 entries and finalists will be announced shortly via the website with screenings taking place at the Crown & Sceptre.

The Stroud Film Festival is organised by volunteers and there is some, but not much, funding. The BFI has provided some help with equipment hire, Stroud Council has provided money for publicity and Stroud Arts Festival, along with Lansdown Film Club, have provided funding for a special event put on by the youth drama group Flies on the Wall run by Jo Bousfield. Flies in Frame will screen ten short films made by the young members of the drama group and Jo is delighted with the "quirky" "funny" and "interesting" results! Six members of the group are planning the event themselves which will be held at the 3 in 1 Horsley supported by Air in G's Young Promoters Scheme. The event also includes circus entertainment, live music and feedback on the films from two local film professionals





including Andrew Speller a cameraman who has worked on films such as the 1984 version of 1984 and Pip Heywood editor with the Natural History Unit.

Elsewhere the festival goes Nordic at Atelier for a documentary on a subject dear to Stroud's heart: good farming and good food. Good Things Await is about an independent farmer in Denmark directed by acclaimed Danish director Phie Ambo. The Star Anise will then feature Songs from the Soil, also by Ambo which uses some of the themes from Good Things Await and combines them with the music of Arvo Pärt. The evening includes installations and a meal priced at £25.

As to the best of the rest, there are further events scheduled at the SVA including Harvey Brook's Music Doc series, cycling poetry and film at Atelier, a selection of films by local film maker Alasdair Ogilvie at Open House with music from Eyebrow and the Red Propellers plus poetry from Jeff Cloves and Dennis Gould, more rousing singing in Benda Bilili at the same venue, a documentary from the Congo and a Q & A with project manager Annie McKean on a film called Stand or Fall from Winchester University about producing a play in prison. The festival rounds off with The Salt of the Earth at Lansdown, a film by Wim Wenders about the life and work of photographer Sebastião Salgado.

ON A RELATIVELY MODEST SCALE THIS FIRST OFFERING HAS LOTS TO ENJOY. I SPOKE

WITH HIM IN MR TWITTCHET'S CAFE BAR AT THE SUBS ABOUT THE FESTIVAL...

WHAT INSPIRED YOU TO START A COMEDY FESTIVAL IN STROUD?

Having seen some great comedy in the other towns I've worked in around the country, then meeting the promoter of the Cheltenham and Leamington festivals, I thought – we could do that! The conversations started and pretty soon we had a plan.

WHAT MADE YOU CHOOSE MITCH BENN AS THE FESTIVAL HEADLINER?

people add musical value to things. I enjoy Mitch's take on life on shows such as The Now Show on BBC Radio 4 and felt that his combination of humour, satire and intelligent comment was something that Stroud audiences would go for.

TELL ME ABOUT THE STRUMPETS...

I saw them last year at the Convent and they were just brilliant. As it happened, when we then spoke about dates, their March availability was exactly when we wanted the festival to be so it seemed serendipitous. They remind me very much of Fascinating Aida, although this is probably a comparison that they're fed up with! They can really sing, first and foremost, have a great stage presence and, of course, a brilliant name. I did wonder about how best to address them when we first spoke – were they "A Fanfare" or were they "The Strumpets"? Being a gentleman, I asked which they preferred. The girls are hugely entertaining, very talented and will add a touch of sophistication and glamour to the week!

WAS IT IMPORTANT TO YOU TO INCLUDE A LOCAL ELEMENT?

Yes, very much so. I believe very strongly in programming as broad a selection of work at the Subscription Rooms as I can, combining local talent with national and international performers. The local scene here is so very strong in all artistic disciplines and I think part of my role is to help nurture that.

THE LATE N LOCAL SHOW WITH COMEDY TALENT FROM STROUD AND FURTHER AFIELD IN THE WEST BEING PART OF THAT SUPPORT FOR LOCAL TALENT...

Yes. And that title by the way was coined by Mark Makin from the Cheltenham Comedy Festival who very kindly bequeathed it to me. Plus of course there is local lad Bill Jones reprising his hilariously maudlin Miserable Malcolm show at the Queen Vic's Little Vic.

AND... AHEM... IF I MIGHT ALSO PLUG THE SHOWCASE OF MY STROUD STAND-UP COURSE THAT YOU HAVE KINDLY INCLUDED IN THE FESTIVAL?

Yes! I love the idea of having a real, proper show for performers who have been through a formalised learning process, rather than them just going home and thinking, well now what? The Stand Up Course Showcase on the Saturday night at the Subscription Rooms will hopefully provide them with the real adrenaline rush of a gig, and get them hooked to do more.

OH IT DEFINITELY WILL. THESE END OF COURSE GIGS ARE ALWAYS A BLAST AND PEOPLE ARE ALWAYS AMAZED AT THE STANDARD. AND WHILE I'M PLUGGING THINGS, THANKS FOR LETTING ME BOOK THE AMAZING SCUMMY MUMMIES AS PART OF THE FESTIVAL ON THE SUNDAY AT BLACK BOOK CAFE. THEY WENT DOWN SO WELL AT THE FRINGE LAST YEAR THAT BRINGING THEM BACK FOR THIS FESTIVAL - AND ON MOTHER'S DAY TOO! - WAS IRRESISTIBLE. ANYWAY, ITS GREAT BLACK BOOK AND THE LITTLE VIC ARE BOTH LAUGH OUT STROUD VENUES ALONGSIDE THE SUBS ROOMS THIS YEAR. MIGHT OTHERS COME ON BOARD IN FUTURE YEARS?

Oh yes. I'd encourage other venues and bars/ restaurants/book shops/banks/estate agents, you name it, to get involved and have some kind of performance during festival week. Many years ago I played at the Cork Jazz Festival and was delighted to see a trio playing in one of the town centre banks during the day beside a make shift bar selling Guinness! Performances don't need to take place on a stage. I love the idea of Laugh Out Stroud really taking over the town for one week in Spring each year

IF YOU COULD LAUNCH ANOTHER NEW FESTIVAL WHAT WOULD IT BE? ALTHOUGH WITH SO MANY FESTIVALS IN STROUD NOW I WONDER IF THERE IS A GENRE THE TOWN HASN'T GOT COVERED. ...

Yes we are a bit 'festivalised' aren't we. If I were to consider another one, I would like to think about a Chamber Music Festival. But what I'd really like to see is all the festivals coming under one banner and working together to really make Stroud the Edinburgh of the South West. Edinburgh is renowned the world over for its Festival but there are, in fact, a growing number of festivals under that banner. Their slogan is "Edinburgh: One city, many festivals" and I'd love that to be the way people looked at Stroud. The combined artistic and financial potential of all the festivals working together throughout the year would be a huge boost to the town and the area. This would allow us to jointly investigate wider and larger funding options, reducing the amount of "public" money involved and helping us all build better projects; it would benefit businesses from bed and breakfasts to bakers; and it would really put Stroud on the cultural map.

FINALLY, WHAT HAS BEEN YOUR PERSONAL FAVOURITE FESTIVAL EXPERIENCE IN STROUD?

There can really only be one, Chris - The JP All Stars Brass Band at the Queen Vic during last year's Stroud Fringe! Seeing the entire Vic courtyard rammed with people singing along with arms outstretched and 'goggles' on to The Dambusters will stay with me for a long time!

PERCIVAL

HYPOTHETICALLY SPEAKING, IF I WERE TO PRESENT TOM PERCIVAL WITH A CHECKLIST OF CREATIVE SKILLS, I'M PRETTY SURE THERE'S NOT ONE BOX THAT HE WOULDN'T BE ABLE TO TICK. IN FACT, TO PIN TOM TO ONE PARTICULAR MEDIUM AT ALL WOULD NOT ONLY BE INACCURATE, BUT WOULD CREATE AN UNFAIR PICTURE OF WHO HE REALLY IS.

Best known, perhaps, for the spine-chilling artwork he created for Derek Landy's Skulduggery Pleasant series, Tom's latest venture combines a talent for illustration with his first collection of junior fiction books: "The series is called Little Legends and the first book of that is probably the third fiction book I've ever written." Though Tom's previous attempts at junior fiction were unsuccessful, he has, over the past six years. created for himself a reputation as a successful author and illustrator of children's picture books. producing titles such as Herman's Letter and Jack's AMAZING Shadow. But Tom's path to publication was not a speedy one and it was whilst working at an advertising agency in London that he first began to forge a freelance career: "I did quite a lot of interactive and video work as part of that job and that laid the foundations for a lot of the skills that I have now...from doing that I did bits and pieces of illustration work for some of the clients we used to work for and then slowly I started building a portfolio..."

Although the work - in Tom's words - wasn't always particularly glamorous ("I started off basically in the Vauxhall Conference of the illustration world where I was doing lots of stuff for educational books and school text books..."), eventually, an overheard conversation brought his name to greater prominence: "...I was working for them [Harper Collins] two days a week doing their advertising work and I just happened to overhear some people sat around a table talking about this series that they were having difficulty finding an illustrator for...I said, let me have a go, if you don't like it then no worries, if you like it then we'll take it from there." That series was Derek Landy's award-winning Skulduggery Pleasant and it is

whilst discussing this particular period in Tom's career that he references the creative challenges he faced as Landv's books grew in popularity: "...by the time you get to the last two or three books there's a lot of weight of expectation on it... that's part of illustration, I guess, responding to the needs of the people you're working with. It's not just about being able to draw nice pictures, you have to be able to interpret someone's needs and then make it into something you personally can engage with as well."

The Little Legends series follows the new and exciting antics of our favourite fairy-tale characters, such as Little Red Riding Hood and Rapunzel, as well as introducing children to faces that are perhaps a little less familiar, like the West African folktale character, Anansi. In creating this series, Tom felt it was important that his characters' deal with issues that children could relate to, such as experiencing jealousy or feeling let down, whilst also adding something a little different to their traditional characteristics: "Ella - who is Cinderella - has a fairy god-brother and he's her annoying little brother...again, I'm trying to take these established conventions and then sort of put a new twist on it." Aimed at five to eight-vear-olds. Tom admits that he's learnt a lot about writing for older children since creating the Little Legends series and it would appear that having someone at home to test the books out has also come in very handy: "My youngest son is five and he can't read the books himself, but he really enjoys having them read to him. That's the challenge with these because even though it's older than picture books in loads of ways the language has to be simpler because it's essentially designed for children to read independently.



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During our thirty-minute interview there's barely time to touch on the electronic music that Tom creates or the videos he has produced to promote the works of David Walliams and Oliver Jeffers. Neither is there time to discuss, in any great depth, his animations or his background in graphic design. And yet, it is always there, touched on briefly, influencing our conversation in the same way that all these separate skills seem to influence his ideas, his next big project. As we wrap up, Tom expresses his work in a way that seems to untangle the many threads of his creative portfolio and sums him up perfectly: "I communicate stories and ideas - that's the key."
