





Adam White

When I meet Adam he is caught between preparing for Open Studios and finishing a body of work for his forthcoming exhibition at the Museum in the Park. His studio is crowded with sculptures and rolled up paintings, finished or in progress.

He picks things up or directs my attention towards castings, enthusing about the light refracting quality of the resins that he likes to work with, explaining the multiple meanings embedded in each piece. Objects and ideas seem densely layered, like archaeological strata. A certain amount of creative chaos is evident, which belies his highly planned and systematic approach to making and the detailed investigative approach that characterizes his working methods. In the centre of the space sits a new work, a section of tree trunk, the rotten interior of which is apparently encrusted with wood resin that has crystallised into clusters of hexagonal nodes. More resin oozes from a gaping wound in the trunk. The impression is of something between a natural organic process of decay and a catastrophic parasitic infestation. Either way the object is in a state of transition - from one material to another, from one state of being to another.

This kind of transformation seems central to Adam's work - most often mapping slow, geological or evolutionary processes of change. He unrolls a large painting that depicts a plesiosaur, an aquatic dinosaur, its skeleton partially revealed, overlaid with other figures - humans, a winged rodent. These figures seem to dissolve into, or to be indivisible from, the dinosaur and each other Drifting around this cruciform image are more ambiguous shapes. leaves, or seed cases perhaps votive objects, each containing a further image of evolving life. In one of the floating pods a giant penguin is pursuing a killer whale - a role reversal in which the prey has outevolved its hunter. At the base of the painting a pair of cupped hands are shown, opening to suggest an originating, god-like presence. unleashing an endlessly unfolding, and endlessly fecund, process of generation. Like much of Adam's work, this painting occupies a space somewhere between a rational

scientific diagram and a schematic for a symbolic narrative of how the world began. The symbolism is typically rich and complex, but unresolved, open to multivalent interpretations.

The almost theological nature of the symbolism bolsters an attitude of morality that hangs about the work. Adam's interest in these weighty matters is not purely academic. He is addressing the mysteries of life and death, asking questions about how we should live. If this sounds overwhelmingly loaded with significance, it should be said that Adam's philosophical inclination and the undoubted seriousness of his intentions is often surprisingly and engagingly leavened by jokes or humour, sometimes hidden or embedded in the detail of his work.

Adam's large paintings are alive with ideas, but they also demonstrate an attention to technique. He uses technically experimental approaches to watercolour paints for instance.

A medium often associated with more modest sketches or gentle subjects is here used on a very large scale to create translucent. indefinite surfaces as well as precise draughtsmanship. There is a tension between the very deliberate, analytical image making and the characteristic tendency of the liquid paint to flow and bloom when it meets the absorbent paper. Images swim in and out of clarity. The sometimes darkly portentous content is matched by a decorative. seductive, beauty. The ambition of Adam's vision is matched by his technical mastery.

Many of Adam's concerns seem esoteric, referring to creation myths and hinting at complex unifying theories. He has a wide-ranging and detailed knowledge, particularly of zoology, palaeontology and geology. He is a member of a number of geological societies and, when he isn't working through the night in his studio, he can often be found on the banks of the River Severn, fossil hunting. Listening

to him talk he can seem like a gentleman of the early Romantic period, an 18th century amateur scholar, the Reverend White, strolling about the countryside in a dark frock coat with his geologists hammer, searching for ichthyosaur bones, his head full of wonder and poetry, resisting the reductive natural philosophies of the Enlightenment, formulating theories of the universe that insist on the importance of subjective experience and the imagination alongside methodical scientific inquiry

For his upcoming exhibition at The Museum in the Park Adam will be showing his large watercolours alongside sculptural works that explore both the underlying structures of the physical world and the stories that we use to explain the world to ourselves, the mythologies that we live by. Notwithstanding the singularity of his vision, Adam has invited various other artists to respond to or interpret the material that he is

dealing with. The programme will include a half-term fossil hunt as well as an interactive installation by artists Emily Joy and Alison Cockcroft, working as Periscope. There will be live performances by artists Uta Baldauf and Kirsty Limburn, and a musical recital involving a Geiger counter by Sean Roe and Richard Dean.

Taking place in beautiful hidden gardens around Church Place in Rodborough on June 10-11, the spaces range from pub gardens and intimate cottage styles to larger landscaped gardens and the fascinating 'secret garden' surrounding Rodborough Court. Fach garden will include a sculpture, and some will have demonstrations from artists.

Set up in 2015 by garden designer Sarah Watts, author Katie Fforde (whose garden Sarah designed and looks after), and others in the local community, this year features around 15 sculptors, including Amanda Moriarty, Christian Vaughan Jones, David King, Freddie Wise, Gabriel Bennett, Helen Lomberg. Ian Rank-Broadley. Kim Francis. Marion Mitchell, Mike Bigland, Paul Grellier, Spencer Jenkins, Sammy Adams and Tom Harvey. New artists include ceramicist Adrian Bates: metalwork artist Dan Rawlings; and stonemason Sebastien David. "It's a nice mix of existing and new people," Sarah explains. "Lots of them are local, but we've also got someone from Warwickshire, South Wales, and further afield." The artists are usually people the organisers have discovered through their interest in art and recommendations from others. "It's also looking at who takes part in the Open Studios, conversations with Stroud Valleys Artspace (SVA)," says Sarah. "The idea long term would be to have a selection process. So far I feel like we've had really good quality artists and an interesting range of different media

Before the event. Sarah takes the artists around the gardens so they can respond to the space. "Many of the artists make pieces for specific

locations." Sarah explains.

Tom Harvey, who makes amazing wooden sculptures out of tree trunks, along with Helen Lomberg and Dave King, will be demonstrating in the gardens. giving visitors a rare insight into the making process. "Any piece of sculpture represents a huge amount of effort and time from the person that has made it, so to actually see it being made and to be able to have a conversation with the person making it is really helpful for someone perhaps thinking about buying the work, so they really understand the process," says Sarah."We're very used to being able to buy things relatively cheaply and we have a very throwaway idea of a lot of the things we surround ourselves with. so to understand a little bit more about the processes of unique pieces that are being made by

hand, helps to inform a different way of thinking about what you might be choosing to spend your money on. You buy a piece of sculpture, it's essentially something that is with you for life and for your family, it's an investment piece.' The works range from the very affordable to more expensive All the pieces are available to buy, and most of the artists are available for commissions

New for 2017 is an exhibition of sculpture created by local primary school children."We're really trying to broaden the appeal this year because we've got funding to do workshops for children," Angela Dyer, who is on the committee along with Sarah, explains "We're doing one in Rodborough School and Gastrells School and those sculptures are going to be displayed over the weekend, and there will also be free drop-in

workshops for children on the Sunday. We've tried to create a really interesting feel for the event and make it a lovely day out for everybody and we've generally had really positive feedback." The majority of people who visit are from Gloucestershire, says Angela, but the event's proximity to the Open Gardens (which began in May and runs all summer) means visitors are broadening out location wise. "It's a wider opportunity for getting people to come to Gloucestershire," says Angela.

Other happenings over the

weekend include book signings by Kate Fforde, whose latest release The Secret Garden appropriately tells the story of talented gardener (and frankly beautifully-named... ahem) Lorna and her plantswoman friend Philly who work in the grounds of a beautiful manor house in the Cotswolds. There will also be plant sales, cake and refreshments and a talk from Julie Wickham of Stroud Valleys Project (SVP) on creating wildlife habitats in gardens. All the proceeds go to The Old Endowed School; the event's partnership charity SVP; and a third charity that changes each year this year it's bereavement charity Ronan's Trust.

The main sponsor is Omnitrack who are based on Rodborough Court, one of the gardens open for the event. "Without their funding it wouldn't happen," says Angela. "Corporate responsibility in a local community and contributing to their local community, so I think it knits everything in really well."

After you've had your fill of cake, head to The Prince Albert for a BBQ, live music from 5pm on Saturday, June 10. The pub's garden includes some sculptures that particularly lend themselves for display at night...

Rachel Mcdonnell


Rachel McDonnell is a painter whose preoccupations include light, and our experiences of it. paying homage to the minutiae/ nealected things in life through the medium of painting, optical trickery and pattern. Beyond that she has interests in philosophy and politics, feminism and the environment, amongst other things, all of which feed into her work, though not necessarily in a straightforward way.

She tries to amalgamate thoughts and ideas about art and the world into something which draws the viewer in, and might lead them both to appreciate the work as an object in itself, and also to think about both the work and its subject

Recent works include both landscapes inspired by the odd wander in the five valleys and further afield (there aren't as many of these as she'd like, as she and her partner have had two daughters since moving to Stroud nearly seven years ago, which has been a limiting factor on both work and wandering time), and a series of more abstract works formed of dots. These play with the idea of creating something three dimensional using only the simplest two dimensional shapes (the rectangle of the canvas, and the circles that form the image). Some of this series is just three dimensional, others are thoroughly confusing and disorienting, as the dots seem to shift about, boggling the eye and confusing the brain.

As her children get bigger. Rachel is looking forward to having more time in the studio and out and about, and finally making it to the monthly Walking the Land artists walks after four years of trying and missing!







Graham Harvey: No Finer Life

Graham Harvey is the agricultural story editor for BBC Radio 4's long-running soap, as well as the writer of more than 600 scripts for the show and books such as The Killing of the Countryside. It's safe to say that he is deeply embedded in rural Britain, and in the matters that drive it.

So it's no surprise that the new play he has written, and which stops off in Stroud's St. Laurence's Church this month, is about the land, and the people who inhabit it. No Finer Life is not a fictional play. however. Imagine, if you will, that The Archers had started life as a documentary series during World War Two, and you'll begin to get the idea.

The play tells the remarkable story of Elizabeth Henderson, a young woman who craves the farming life, despite the fact that she was not born to it, and made sure that she became involved in it by joining the Women's Land Army towards the end of the war, heading off to milk cows at a nearby farm. For her 19th birthday, Elizabeth's mother bought her the wartime bestseller The Farming Ladder, about the management of a small farm in the Cotswolds run by George Henderson, which laid out a chemical-free method of farming that was wildly successful - astonishingly so, in these days of monoculture farming and pesticides with everything

"In its day," says Graham, "this little farm of just 87 acres produced more food per acre than almost any farm in Britain. In fact it was so productive that the Ministry of Agriculture bussed in hundreds of farmers to show them the way to feed the nation in wartime. With no pesticides and few chemical fertilisers, George and his brother Frank built up the fertility of their little farm using entirely natural methods. That's why as well as producing copious amounts of food it remained rich in wildlife. In The Farming Ladder, George says the land on their small Cotswold farm was so poor, they needed to stock it with large numbers of cattle, sheep and poultry to build the fertility to grow the bumper wheat crops the war-torn nation needed. Together grazing animals, poultry and pasture plants are nature's method of re-cycling carbon - taking carbon dioxide

from the air and storing it in the soil. Then through the ceaseless actions of unimaginable numbers of soil microbes it's turned into compounds plants can use to grow. George Henderson reckoned that if all of Britain were farmed in the way he and his brother did it, the nation could easily feed a population of 100 million."

Graham Harvey is a keen advocate of respecting the basic laws of nature, and sees the results of the modern methods as: '... ruined soils, polluted streams, contaminated food and lost wildlife.' "There's only one answer." he says. "We need to put grassland and grazing back into farm rotations. It'll bring a whole new life to our countryside. The play is as much about the

people as it is about the farming

practice, though, Elizabeth,

reading The Farming Ladder in one sitting throughout the night ("even though she had to be up at 5am to do the milking"), decided that she had to work on George Henderson's astonishing farm. "She persuaded George to take her on as a farm pupil," says Graham, "even though they'd only ever employed young men in the past. Before long romance flourished, and with the war entering its final days George and Elizabeth were married. Suddenly, this young woman from Ilminster found herself helping to run the most famous farm in the land. She was also drawn into George's campaign to save small farms and prevent what he saw as the political takeover of farming through the back door of farm subsidies."

"For me Elizabeth and George are unsung heroes. I read George's book in my student days. By that time it was over 30 years old. But, like Elizabeth, I was inspired by it. In a land of factory farms, farm amalgamations and relentless mechanisation, it presented an alternative vision: a countryside of family farms, thriving villages and teeming wildlife

"Though I've told many country stories in The Archers over the vears, none has inspired me more than that of Elizabeth and George Henderson. I believe it has much to teach us today about our relationship with the land and the food we buy. Many flaws are emerging from our system of modern industrial agriculture soil erosion, flooding, pesticide contamination Who's to say George's creative approach won't be equally inspiring to a new generation in post-Brexit Britain?'

Elizabeth herself is still alive, a sprightly 93 year old still living on the small farm that inspired the play. Her determination, and the prodigious bounty of the farm she helped to manage as Britain faced the austerity of war, ringed by U-Boats preventing the delivery of food from beyond these shores. have been honoured well.

No Finer Life stops off on the Stroud leg of its tour at St. Laurence's Church on June 12th at 7.30 p.m. The night opens with a short reading of farming poems by a certain poet of this parish who has been the Pasture-fed Livestock Association's poet in residence for the past year, and the play itself is followed by a Q&A session with Graham Harvey, who will be answering questions about the play The Farming Ladder and even The Archers...



If you caught her solo show at the Albert last October, you'll have heard her duet with the lovable folk-punk rocker Austin Lucas, who she'd prised away from Nashville for a European tour. And all the while, she was getting ready to release her Memphis soul album. Sweet Kind of Blue, which was recorded at the legendary Sam Phillips Recording Service - the vast studio Phillips designed following his success producing Elvis, Johnny Cash, Howlin' Wolf and many more. The album is finally out now, and Barker's new sound, complete with Al Greene's horn section, is already a hit with the critics

Barker's first visit to a hallowed old American studio was across the state line from Tennessee, in Alabama, When visiting Nashville a few years ago, she recalls, "I drove down to Muscle Shoals and went to Fame studios, and it was just amazing. Aretha Franklin is one of my inspirations and she recorded there, and Etta James. so many legends and seeing this old equipment..." It was love at first sight.

As luck would have it, when considering producers for the new record, she was introduced to the Grammy-winning young Memphian sound engineer and producer Matt Ross-Spang. He cut his teeth at the late Sam Phillips' original shop-front studio, Sun, and had recently made his base at Sam Phillips Recording Service, "In America, we don't have ancient churches and castles like you do in Britain," says Ross-Spang, "but we have studios like this that to me are our version of those churches and castles. This place is just like walking into Phillips' brain."

And so last June, Barker headed to Phillips' Tennessee cathedral of sound, with little more than her beautiful 1937 Gibson acoustic guitar and a sheaf of new songs. Invited along for the ride, I arrive just as Barker pulls in for her first day of sessions. "I can't believe it's today - I'm so excited!" she says, smiling broadly under the warm. Southern sun. Sam Phillips' son Jerry, and granddaughter, Halley have swung by to welcome Barker. Unlike Sun, and Stax Records across town (Otis Redding, Booker T and the MGs and Isaac Hayes), this studio hasn't been made into a museum. The tapes have continued to roll

here since 1960, which makes the private tour all the more spine tingling. Upstairs there's a tiny bar room with spirographic wallpaper, an atomic light and Johnny Cash's cigarette burns on the Formica counter. "Nothing in here has changed," says Halley. "Elvis. Johnny Cash. Carl Perkins. uhuh, they'd all come and sit here and drink, same stools and

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Fach take is counted in by drummer Steve Potts, who has played with Booker T and the MGs and Neil Young, "No one else drums like him," says Ross-Spang. Low lighting sets the mood for other tracks, and emotions flow accordingly. During a break from No. 5 Hurricane (which Couser describes thusly: "two words: Quentin, Tarantino.") Barker breathes: "I was getting



everything. Crazy huh?" The white furnishings and red shag carpet in Sam's old office still look brand new, and the sofa that sits outside it is off being restored by rock god and former upholsterer, Jack White.

Downstairs in Studio A, a group of Memphis' finest musicians (many of whom played on Cat Power's record, the Greatest) have assembled. The studio is largely as it was when the Yardbirds recorded Train Kept A Rollin there in the early '60s. There's the same old Hammond organ, Jerry Lee Lewis' session piano and the original cigarette machine (just 75 Cents a pack).

Ross-Spang is riding high after his success with Something More than Free by Jason Isbell (who hails from Muscle Shoals and is a former member of Drive Bv Truckers) and Midwest Farmer's Daughter, the breakthrough

makes the whole song sway in this beautiful way. You just can't teach that." Fittingly, Potts' count in is the first thing you hear on the finished album, having been kept on the title track.

Over the coming days, as the band works through Barker's 11 songs, the mutual respect in the room swells to bursting point. Guitarist Dave Cousar tells Barker a few songs in: "your voice is like an iceberg," because every day he hears her do something new and surprising. By day four it feels like they've all known each other for years. When they've found their collective groove for the new song, If We Forget to Dance, Ross-Spang can't tear himself away from the studio floor. "This is some baby-making music," he says, and starts adding his own percussion, drumming the back of a guitar. At some point, Barker struts out of her vocal booth to put lipstick on

tingly again." To which Rick Steff, on keys responds, "I was tearing up there for a minute.'

"All the session guys," Ross-Spang tells me when the record's finished, "it wasn't just a normal session for them. They've all been calling me and texting me about just how wonderful it was for them. A really great moment I think for all of us."

Running from 30 June-1st July. the weekend is packed with family friendly events and activities including daytime workshops and two evening concerts at St Laurence Parish Church.

Offering a soulful and eclectic musical mix from both mainstream and indigenous sacred traditions the 2017 Festival promises to be more vibrant than ever. This year's line ups include Stroud's own gospel choir - The Gospel Groove, Haziz Egyptian Dance, Tribal Rhythms Orchestra, sitar and tabla duo Samswara, and internationally renowned. Praying for the Rain. who offer a compelling blend of contemporary folk, Celtic and world

The Festival is the brainchild of the Rev. Simon Howell and festival co-director Girish Patel Girish and Simon play music together in the local world fusion devotional dance band the Raga Babas, Now 14-strong Raga Babas are the house band for the Sacred Music Festival.

The idea for the Festival began back in the autumn of 2014 when Girish and others were invited to join a discussion group to give a 'spiritual' input to local planning documents. Girish comments: "I immediately threw the spanner in the works by asking the question, 'What do you mean by 'Spiritual'?' This opened up a debate, which culminated in us not even agreeing about what is 'spiritual' and what is of my question, for how can you define the indefinable?" A few weeks later Simon approached Girish and asked him if he would work with him to create a 'Sacred Music Festival'. Feeling he instinctively knew what Simon had in mind. Girish agreed and after a few months frantic planning the first Festival took place back in July

I can still remember that night which was an absolute spinetingling thrill of an evening that I shall never forget. I can still recall my shock and delight at the Rev. Howell not conforming to my ideas of how a vicar should behave as I noticed his signature Doc Martin's peeping out beneath his garb. With great passion he introduced an immense variety of musical acts

as the melodies and rhythms, the songs and chants, the rhythm of the drum and the heartbeat of silence were all seamlessly woven together. I sensed that something special was taking place. The aisles of the church were full of people dancing with wild and gay abandon. The church was pulsating with life. This was no ordinary 'gig'. And that night the sheer delight and wonder of it all took me to a place inside myself that I experience as 'spiritual' or 'sacred'. A natural and legal 'high' free from side effects other than a heightened tendency for smiles and laughter and to feel more open and connected with others, a meeting from the heart rather than the head. Perhaps this is testament to the power of music to connect at a heart level, with Girish urging "I would love people to come along and just experience the music and sharing that together help us to connect where it really matters, which is with the heart." Thinking along similar lines Simon believes that music has the power to breakdown the walls and barriers we put up between us in the effort to keep ourselves 'safe' and protect our vested interests. He savs "with

As one festivalgoer said last year: "What I value about it is the timing in the political context ... it's just so well placed in people's hearts." So once again may this year's Festival bring us together, to let our hearts and souls be touched, so that if music is indeed the food of love, play on...

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
