Jazz Stroud

I first discovered jazz in Stroud. It was in the second-hand record section of the original Trading Post...

There were two LPs that caught my eye; one by guitarist Mike Stern called Time In Place, and a gatefold Miles Davis album, You're Under Arrest, from his gritty 1980s funk-edged phase. Around age 17, I was also passed a cassette of the first album by Bristol saxophonist Andy Sheppard, which also helped fuel my curiosity. Having taken up the bass guitar age 12, I soon progressed from Level 42 to Weather Report and Stanley Clarke. In my early twenties I played my first jazz gigs in Stroud at the Golden Fleece where I met a guitarist who I went on to play with in Oxford, also moving to the city in the late 1990s. My love of jazz and bass instantly connected me to Oxford's student jazz scene where a brilliant young undergraduate saxophonist by the name of Soweto Kinch was tearing it up at the weekly jam nights; we played a few gigs too at the time. A couple of years later I got a iob in Brighton writing for a fledgling music website in the heady early days of the Internet and the dotcom boom, which connected me with the wider music industry and would eventually necessitate a move to London just to keep pace with all that was going on.

The dotcom bubble burst and I was thrown into the world of freelancing but my record company contacts saved me and I had work straight away. My passion for writing about music was also developing and led me to start contributing a few reviews for Jazzwise magazine and also become the jazz editor at Time Out in London. Time Out really was the glue that held many small and developing scenes together in the capital through its extensive live listings. I'm proud to have played a part in nurturing a new generation of jazz talent that has led on to much of what it is happening today. Ten years on and Time Out is now a free sheet and sadly a shadow of its former self, but I moved on and now edit Jazzwise. I've immersed myself in the London jazz scene as listener and participant, writing about music but also playing jazz at many of the key venues such as Ronnie Scott's, Pizza Express Jazz Club and 606 Club with some of the best musicians around.

Yet, it's been on my regular return visits to Stroud to see family and friends that I've often thought, 'wouldn't it be great to bring a slice of the London scene here?' To share the amazing home–grown talents

that frequent the many big city live music spaces, and get a lot more people to hear just how brilliantly energising and imaginative British iazz musicians are. Well now lazz Stroud is happening and that hope has become a reality. Stroud has been nurturing a love of jazz via the SVA and the irrepressible enthusiasm of Neil Walker and his team. They've put together a festival that truly reflects the youthful energy that's fuelling the current surge of interest in jazz, as well as a programme that showcases some the UK's finest jazz musicians. It's also a programme that links Stroud's long-held love of dance grooves, with female saxophonist Nubya Garcia topping the bill on Saturday, Garcia's infectious stage presence and powerful sax tone are a clarion call to the head and the hips, effortlessly combining the worlds of spiritual jazz and Afrobeat with heady iazz improvisation. She's also one of the leading lights of a new wave of female instrumentalists who are shaking up jazz's male dominated history, and lazz Stroud's programme also includes several female-led bands including neo-jazz-soul influenced singers Aisling Iris Quartet and Ruth Royall, saxophonist Kim Cypher and groups such as Feelgood Experiment, Bahla, We Are Leif and Caravela. The current scene's openness to electro grooves and beats can also be heard via fizzing Cuban jazztronica troupe Ariwo, the sample cut ups of Anchorsong, wild layered jazz-dance of Mermaid Chunky or the mashed-up soundscapes of trumpet/drums duo Eyebrow.

The piano-led Sunday night headliners Ivo Neame Quartet, possess a distinctly English melodic sensibility, which is hooked to a wider European outlook as well as unfettered, highintensity improvisations. Neame has a new album entitled Moksha out on Edition Records and he explained how his music is developed: "I try and absorb ideas from all kinds of places, people, books, films and art in general. Sometimes there will be specific references to things I have been experiencing, other times there is an indirect reference. One tune called 'Pala' is a response to a book by Aldous Huxley called Island, which is a story about a utopian island where everything works really well and people get along with each other. A far cry from our world unfortunately but hopefully there is a sense of a parallel reality in the tune. A poem called 'Vegetarians' by Roger McGough inspired another tune. I set the words of the poem to music to try and use the natural rhythm of the poetry to provide a melody."

Neame's Quartet includes three superb players who all come from different backgrounds but combine with fire and finesse in the band. "The band features George Crowley, Tom Farmer and James Maddren," says Neame. "I picked these players because they bring incredible expertise and spirit to whatever

musical situation they find themselves in. I know I can put virtually anything in front of them and they will be able to make musical sense of it very quickly; sometimes it feels James knows the tune before he's seen the chart or heard it! We started playing at the




beginning of 2017. We did one or two rehearsals, a few gigs then went into the studio."

It is true that jazz seems to be hitting a new stride with younger people really embracing the music and major record labels now signing UK artists for the first time since the early 2000s. Ivo points out that the public are often short-changed by the usual cultural gatekeepers when it comes to how jazz is presented: "I think the media are deciding to be positive about jazz, which is good. There is a real problem with respect between the media and the general public and it's an obvious thing to say but audiences must be respected. The general public can handle more challenging music than a lot of industry people think is the case – they can handle improvisation. In fact, I think people crave it. We live in a world where everything is becoming more and more robotic and automated and people want a release from that and the chance to experience something human and real. lazz is a form of music that can provide that – it's the main thing going

It's when musicians and audiences really connect through those unique moments of spontaneous creativity, which makes jazz so special. It's hugely gratifying to see such a creative place such as Stroud embracing this deeply artistic music through a festival which will see jazz thrive in all its forms.

Jazz Stroud runs from Friday 25th until Sunday 27th May across various venues in the centre of Stroud including the Brunel Good's Shed, SVA John Street, the Marshall Rooms, the Ale House and the Imperial Hotel. Visit jazzstroud.org for further information including tickets and the full programme.

A collaboration between electronic artist, Jez Bernholz (who also performs live as part of Gazelle Twin), and long-time musician and Stroud resident, Neil Arthur, Ideal Home is an exercise in melodic minimalism far removed from Neil's chart-focussed beginnings as part of Blancmange. I caught up with Neil at the end of Blancmange's recent tour to find out how Near Future and the LP came about...

How long have you lived in Stroud?

About 11 years, after being Londonbased for the best part of threeand-a-half decades, and now I can't imagine living anywhere else. I work mostly on a laptop and occasionally my phone, so I can work anywhere - the kitchen table or a quiet corner. I don't always need to go into a recording studio - it's all about the ideas, not the equipment.

That's a big difference to how you started out with Blancmange, isn't it?

Actually, no. Back then, synths were hugely expensive so we cobbled sounds together using tape loops instead. Near Future was approached very much in the same way using looped sounds, but obviously in the digital realm. The big difference is now we have much more freedom and anything goes – I love what Jez brings to the party, and I can react to it. It's great to be able to collaborate – it takes the pressure off a little.

How did you meet Jez?

I went to see Gazelle Twin perform a couple of years ago, Jez and I got chatting afterwards, got along and I ended up inviting him to play on Blancmange's 'Commuter 23' album tour. We realised we both had a shared love of field recordinas and bands like Neu! and Can, so we decided to have a go at exchanging sound files. That led to the Ideal Home single released in 2016, and we just carried on working together. Then we got invited to perform at Sheffield's Sensoria festival and obviously needed a set, so worked up eight songs and that eventually led to the Ideal Home LP. It's been an intensive journey!

Where did Near Future come from?

Whether it's Blancmange, Fader or Near Future, I'm not really into nostalgia. I don't like to be stuck in a period of time, I always want to be just ahead. There were a couple of names being bandied about for our collaboration, but Near Future just seemed to suit both our mind-sets, so it stuck.

How do you work together?

We get together every so often, but mainly it's through emails, lots of conversations and sending each other sounds. As an example, with Field This, Jez had an idea for a loop, and we each added tiny bits to it over a period of time, then we rearranged it to work with the lyrics.

Field recordings feature quite prominently on the Ideal Home LP; were some recorded in and around Stroud?

Yes, quite a few. Dawn for instance, started out as a cacophony of bird song I recorded on my iPhone while standing outside my kitchen door in the early hours — it's not a loop on the finished track, by the way, it's a continuous recording. When I listened back to it later, I could hear a low murmur in the background – possibly some piece of machinery in a factory. I enhanced it and sent it to Jez, and he came back with this quite sinistersounding loop and lyrics. That's one of my favourite pieces on the album.

It's not always obvious what some of the sounds are – we were roasting some carrots in the oven, and when they came out, they started squeaking, possibly due to the change in temperature. I grabbed my phone to record the sound, and that ended up being mixed with other kitchen noises lining the Field This and Overwhelmed tracks. The field recordings help to link the tracks together, too – we wanted to make it work as one piece.

With titles like Ideal Home and Kites Over Waitrose, is the album a comment on modern living?

Kind of. Ideal Home is about aspects of consumerism, while Kites... was inspired by the panic buying runs on the supermarkets that have happened recently.

Are you planning on doing any more shows as Near Future?

There's talk of doing a few festivals and possibly some dates to showcase the LP. We performed the track, Bulk Erase together before Blancmange's recent shows in Manchester and Liverpool, and that was good fun. There's no computers, it's all done with loops so you really have to be on it - the songs could last for days if you're not careful!

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



John & Astrid Furnival

John and Astrid Furnival came to the Stroud Valleys in 1960. Apart from a period when they based themselves in France and a year long residency in New Mexico, they have lived in and around Nailsworth ever since. So it is fitting that a new exhibition surveying their work, made together and separately over their lifetime, will have its inaugural showing here, split between The Museum in the Park and Ruskin Mill. The Museum show will feature John's drawings, prints and collages, but will have a primary focus on his collaborations with Astrid. Ruskin Mill is showing some of John's remarkable large-scale panoramic drawings.



John came of age at a particularly vivid moment in the history of art. He had studied at the Royal College of Art, where he was a contemporary of David Hockney, Ron Kitaj, Joe Tilson and Peter Blake. Informed by Dada and Surrealism, immersed in contemporary influences such as Pop Art and Beat poetry, the Fluxus and Mail Art movements, he forged a distinctive path. A striking characteristic of John's work is its visual quality, indeed, whilst he is associated with Concrete Poetry, he prefers to call his work visual poetry. Where he uses words, he seems to be constantly undermining their specific meanings. Words appear as random lists, swirling spirals, clouds, teetering towers, formal patterns - sentences dissolve and fragment, resisting resolution into literal sense. Drawn, carved, etched, embossed and constructed. they are almost abstract forms. Their meaning is visual not literary, poetic not concrete. Conversely, his large panoramic landscape and architectural drawings can seem to read like sentences, unfolding as we scan the image from left to right trying to take in the whole scene - Furnival

is taken with Paul Klee's description of 'taking a line for a walk' - that is how he makes these drawings and that is how we read them, the eye follows the line, catching on fine details, like arresting phrases. In their exactitude they transcend mere representation. They are exercises in profound looking, and at the same time, in their deep attentiveness to the visible world, they have an enigmatic, surrealistic quality.

Collaboration is another distinguishing element in his and Astrid's life and work. John has worked closely with various artists, writers and publishers including lan Hamilton Findlay and his friends Dom Silvester Houédard and Jonathan Williams. John and Astrid began makina work collaboratively in the 70's. Astrid was making knitted works, including sweaters and quilts. She pioneered the use of natural dves that she extracted from plants grown in her aarden or collected in the fields around Gloucestershire. Together, they designed text-based knitted objects. As well as John's word formations, Astrid was drawn to the works of avante garde writers such as Joyce and Beckett. The technical and conceptual

quality of this work led to many others in the art world inviting her to knit their words, notably artists Tom Phillips and Ron King and the poet Adrian Mitchell. In another collaboration, John and Astrid founded Satie's Faction, a group that celebrates and promotes the life and work of the Franco-Scottish composer, Erik Satie.



John and Astrid originally came to Gloucestershire so that John could teach, at Cheltenham and Stroud Schools of Art, and later at Corsham, but, as well as paid work, they found, if not a community then at least a critical mass of fellow artists and writers living around the Stroud valleys. At an exhibition of his work in the Gloucester Museum and Art Gallery he met Dom Silvester Houédard, a Benedictine monk at the nearby Prinknash Abbey. An influential figure within the international art world of the 60's and 70's, known in particular for his concrete and kinetic poetry, Houédard became a long standing friend and collaborator. Together, they founded the Openings press, which experimented with new forms of visual poetry. As well as Houédard, there was a striking concentration of poets and artists who were experimenting with words and language living around the Stroud valleys at that time John collaborated, for instance with poets Thomas A Clark and Michael Horowitz and the artist Kenelm Cox. all of whom lived in the area. These associations, as well as his work with Ian Hamilton Finlay, Tom Philips and other international artists connected to Concrete Poetry has led to John being regarded by some as a member of that movement – a reductive designation

One of the pleasures of writing for Good on Paper is that it gives me the opportunity to meet the subjects that I'm writing about. To meet John and Astrid in their home is to encounter an exemplary continuity between art and life. John has recently suffered a stroke, which has circumscribed the scope of his working methods, but each day he sits at a kitchen table (made by their son) and he takes up a pen. He draws whatever is in front of him. He makes art. John is an entertaining storyteller, a raconteur, erudite, wryly humorous. He talks of music and literature, and he talks of friends and collaborators. They are surrounded by artworks made by themselves and their friends and associates. It is on the walls, but also propped up on the mantelpiece, leant against the furniture, stacked on the tables – outside unused experiments are filling gaps in the studio walls. Art is special, but it is the stuff of life, not a rarified thing occupying a separate domain. This sense of coherence is compounded when Bernard shows me family photographs, many of which he has collated into books, where they sit alongside images of work. These intimate images place the work in direct relationship to the richness of an everyday life suffused with creativity and with family and friends. One of the books shows a photograph of David Hockney, a close friend, drawing at a table in their Woodchester cottage,

where he was a frequent visitor, surrounded by the detritus of a recent eaten breakfast. On the same page we see the drawing, and the painting that it eventually let to. This juxtaposition between the intimate and domestic and the remote world of high art is exauisite.


Naturally, these exhibitions have been curated by a friend who has known John and Astrid for many years. Bernard Moxham's knowledge and dedication to his subjects means that the exhibitions will not just showcase a lifetime's work, but will celebrate the wonderfully rich and productive lives of these artists.

John and Astrid's first exhibition 'A
Cotswold Celebration' opens at Ruskin
Mill Gallery, Nailsworth (rmt.org) on
the 19th May and continues until the

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Select Trail:

MILA HARRIS-MUSSI

For two weekends in May, Stroud will introduce the public to its myriad creative inhabitants through the Select Trail Open Studios. From 5-6th and 12-13th, over one hundred creatives will open their doors to give us insight into their creative spaces, tools, techniques and latest works. The trail comes as part of the month long Select Festival, presented annually by acclaimed SIT select to celebrate artists regionally, nationally and internationally. One artist taking part this year is Mila Harris-Mussi, a Stroud based textile designer and maker, who talks to me ahead of the trail about her creative background and what to expect of her work throughout the event.

I meet with Mila at her new studio. a large, blank canvas of open rooms tucked around the back of Merretts Mills Industrial Estate. Her move back to Stroud is a recent one: "I studied textile design, specialising in knitted textiles, at Chelsea Collage of Arts in London", she explains. "I graduated a couple years back and felt determined to keep making my own work, so I applied for an award at the craft-based studio Cockpit Arts funded by the Haberdasher's Guild and Framework Knitter Guild. I was lucky enough to win, and that funded my own studio in London for a year, which was really amazing. When that finished a few months ago, I wanted

the space to continue making large-scale work, so coming back to Stroud felt like the right move."

Mila's work, which is knit based, incorporating casting with resins, innovative yarns and dyeing techniques, is largely about experimentation. and the journey of making is central to her creative process. "When I start a body of work, I usually get fixed on one technique,

material or dye and just see what happens as my experimenting evolves over time," Mila reveals. Her sense of experimentation and innovation is evident in the range of projects she has been involved in: a collaboration with dancer Kara Coffey explored the

interaction between knitted textiles and the body, investigating how unforeseen forms come to life when Mila's fabrics are hung, stretched and pulled against the human form. Her project "structured pleats" saw large knitted fabrics hung as sculptures – twisted and contorted – seemingly on the verge of delightful animation.

Mila's initial inspiration often comes from the material itself. "I want to find out what the material is capable of; what I can do with it in terms of its structure, how complicated the technique can be. I also work a lot with colour, and inspiration for that can come from anything I see. It's exciting to recreate a colour I've found

inspiring. Lately I've been usina more natural dves. and now I'm out of the city I'd like forage or grow my own, which I've never done before. It'd be great to create my own natural colour pallet."

For the Select Trail, Mila is collaborating with two other designers; Mimi Kerpel,

a woven textile designer currently focusing on works with paper, and Daisy Gray, a fine artist recently exploring work with ceramics. "I've known both Mimi and Daisy a long time," Mila tells me, "though we work with different materials, we've all



been investigating the different uses of natural dye so it seemed natural for us to work together for the trail. It's challenging to see how my processes impact their materials, and feels important for me to work with other people like this."

"We're going to be showing an 'installation of objects' ", Mila reveals as I explore the work being prepared for the trail. Gathered on a table, swatches of fabric sampling her dyeing techniques are gathered next to woven baskets and ceramic bowls etched and imprinted with deep indigo dye. Further shards of ceramics are trussed up in materials of deep and vibrant natural hues, next to dyed woven structures evocative of intricate Chinese lanterns. Outside, Mila's experiments with shibori are hung in various stages of completion. The whole hints at an intriguing and innovative collection.

This will be Mila's first time involved in the trail. "Now that I've moved back here it's great opportunity to show people what I do and meet other creatives and designers. I think it's good to show my work and explain to people what I do, and the trail is really important for Stroud."

In addition to Mila and her collaborators, the public can see inside the studios of renowned artists such as Matthew Harris and Tom Knowles Jackson, as well as discovering

something or someone they've never heard of before. Another highlight is an exhibition, entitled 'My Nature', running at the Museum in the Park on Sat 5th and Sun 6th May as part of the Select Festival, where quest artists from France, Thailand, Taiwan and Great Britain will explore textiles, consumerism and the environment using print, stitch, weave and natural dye techniques. This year the trail has new curator, Emma Neuberg who has worked with Director Lizzi Walton to bring together an international group of artists to stimulate new conversations across the trail and beyond.



Site Festival **Open Studios:**

Valerie van Leersum and **Tara Downs**

Site Festival organised by the Stroud Valley Artspace (SVA) mutates every year, and is back for 2018 with an eclectic and international mix of delights. Through Resound Radio, there will be a lot of sound coming out of the SVA nerve centre, from artist dialogues to soundscapes with the incongruous clunk of Dutch shipping history in the distance...

The traditional Open Studios continues too, with artists all over the valleys opening up their spaces for conversation, inspiration and discovery. And the SVA gallery itself will become an Open Studio, encouraging us to focus on the role of artists and the importance of unclaimed, drifting, post-industrial spaces as a breeding ground for creativity.

SVA was set up in 1996, and continues to play a central role in shaping Stroud's cultural scene by holding and accessing spaces in which artists can create. Co-founder Jo Leahy has always been fascinated by artist-run spaces. An early inspiration occurred in the industrial docklands of Amsterdam in 1998, when she met Bert Hogervorst and Peti Buchel, authors of Turning Tide: The Users Role in the Redevelopment of Harbour Buildings in North-West Europe.

20 years on, SVA is bringing Valerie van Leersum from Amsterdam's dockyard-turned-creative hub NDSM to develop new work in the SVA gallery space, alongside the Miniature Museum's Tara Downs, who divides her time between Stroud and Amsterdam and is creating podcasts and soundscapes for the Festival.

Places in Drift

Valerie Van Leersum will be in residence from 4th -14th May. Her show will be partly built up out of work that already exists, work made for the exhibition and work that will be made during the residency. The final show will be an interactive installation with an overall theme about places in transition, drifting with the stream of time.

Radio Droogdok

Artist Tara Downs (Miniature
Museums) is making an audio
exchange between Stroud and
Amsterdam for Site Festival 2018.
Radio Droogdok will be making
and transmitting podcasts from
NDSM and ADM – both former
shipyards in Amsterdam – as well
as Landbouwbelang in Maastricht.
Tara will interview artists as well as
philosophers, anthropologists and
visionaries about urban places in
transition. Listeners can tune in to the
podcasts transmitted through Resound
Radio online.

Van Leersum's studio is at the former NDSM shipyard in Amsterdam, now the largest cultural breeding ground in Europe. A place that tries to maintain independence within the advancing city. Since 2002 van Leersum has been developing a body of work here around the concept of 'Home'. She uses all kinds of media including objects, text, audio, collages and photography, moving between 'factual' history and subjective experience. Growing up, she says, "Moving to different places and between different social classes at

a young age made a big impression. It made me think about identity in relationship to the ground where you were born or where your roots are. Adjusting to places and contexts, made me feel a kind of in-between everybody and everything. A feeling that I like as well as dislike."

"At this moment my home is where my family (two kids and my husband) is, I guess. But for a long time I was kind of searching for home. If you move your home, are you the same person? If the identity of a place changes, what does this mean for the people living there? What happens in the in-between moments? Are we in these moments, autonomic, free from identity and therefore most connected to each other?"

Van Leersum is collaborating

[Leahy] and Neil Walker (co-director of SVA) were researching artist led spaces like Spike Island in Bristol - the story is in the podcast." These movements, according to Downs, "come out of an environment where there is time and space to share ideas and live and work together: all forms and manifestations come out."

In her residency, Downs explains she will be exploring the "chaos of liminal creative space – just allowing things to happen." She will be "using oral histories, using sound and collecting stories – learning the poetry and sculpture of sound – the podcasts go together as a piece as a form of archiving – we are creating a contemporary archive."

Valerie reflects this too: "My work is quite narrative. It moves between



with Stroud's Tara Downs, and they will be co-creating soundscapes, conversations and archives of stories from Stroud and Amsterdam, "Tara and I are both interested in areas that used to be industrial, abandoned and taken over by creative people. We are both connected to those places as my studio is in a formal Shipyard building (NDSM) and Tara lives partly at the docklands of the ADM. Both places are under a lot of pressure from the city and are in transition all the time. This drifting identity interests me the most. The land as silent witness of this process."

Downs and van Leersum met when Downs was researching her MA dissertation in Museum Studies. They found they shared interests not only in transitional environments but also in storytelling and archiving. "Valerie has a strong storytelling element, uses archiving in her work - I loved the way that she worked with her projects" says Downs. "We started to explore ways of working together - the idea of exchange led to development funding from the Arts Council and we began to reflect on the places we live."

Downs spent time in the early 80s as an anthropologist in Amsterdam, "immersed in incredibly creative places, with creative collectives in squats like castles. Around the same time, jo

'factual' history on the one hand, and the subjectively experienced on the other, between documentary and the imagined. I like to see it as a way to start a conversation."

Audiences can join in the conversation at SVA John Street, Sat and Sun 11am-6pm and Weds – Fri 11am-3pm. The preview takes place on Friday 4th May from 6-9pm. In a world so preoccupied with superficial banality, Sparkes' work, although initially appearing tongue-in-cheek, brings with it a more robust message of the conflict between the natural and mechanical worlds. 

Giffords Circus

Dazzling acrobat displays, glittering sequins, majestic horses, calamitous clowns – it's difficult to describe Giffords Circus in one sentence, such is the show's amalgamation of theatrical and circus artistry and more than a light dusting of magic. One thing I am certain of, opening on Friday 4th May at Fennells Farm in Stroud, this year's show is set to be as enthralling, joyful and jaw-dropping as ever.

"We don't fit into any group.
We're a weirdo amongst theatre
people, we're a weirdo amongst
circus people, we don't really fit in
anywhere and I guess that is what
works for us. Someone said to me
recently, circus is the magic word,
and it definitely is," Giffords founder
Nell Gifford tells me as she sits in
Josephs on Union Street, her blonde
hair covered in dye.

It is early April when we meet at the hair salon, and Nell is in the midst of rehearsals for the inimitable, beautiful, bohemian celebration that is Giffords Circus. "I'm sorry, I'm so tired," she apologises throughout our chat, rubbing her head as she spins back and forth on the leather chair.

I'm not surprised.

A riot of live music, horses, chickens, comedy, acrobatics and theatre, Giffords is a 1930s-style touring village-green circus, launched 18 years ago by Nell and her then-husband Toti. This year, Nell is leading a show including new additions of third generation Italian circus performers, The Curatola Brothers, with their hand-to-hand acrobatic act; Diana Vediashkina and her troupe of dachshunds; Lisandra Austin and her aerial silk act; and the Portuguese Dias

Family, a family of eight creating gymnastic and balancing acts.
Alongside these new acts, many fan favourites will be returning to the tent including Nell herself with her stunning equestrienne act; Tweedy the Clown; Nancy Trotter Landry who originally joined the circus at the age of 19; Dany Reyes, with his juggling routines; expert horseman Dany Cesar; and Alfredo and the highly acclaimed Pozo the Strongman.

2018 marks 250 years since the circus was invented in London by Philip Astley, an 18th-century trick rider (although, as Nell points out, it's difficult to pin point a date, as circus itself is an alchemy of many art forms). To mark the milestone, Giffords new show, My Beautiful Circus, celebrates circus itself. "It's about seeing it through a child's eye and thinking about what makes it really special and beautiful," Nell explains.

Growing up in a creative household "full of books" in North Oxford (one of Nell's four siblings is famed pottery designer Emma Bridgewater) – "I was brought up with an arts background. My mum was really into home making, kind of homemade fun, and that is what is in the circus," she says – Nell's

first circus memory is of the Moscow State Circus when she was a young teen. "I fell in love with all the colour and the movement and the music."

She studied English at Oxford University, before travelling the world working for several circuses, including as a popcorn vendor at the Chinese State Circus and acting as ring-mistress for Santus Circus in France. It was this international experience that made Nell view British circus in a new light. "It is interesting because it is an English invention in a sense, but we ended up as a country not putting any value on circuses. People say, 'oh they're commercial' and everything, but I really think it's great that there is a travelling form of theatre that exists without having to be organised by a committee and have funding from the government. It's a folk art, and should really be celebrated. I think they have been judged really harshly and driven to the very fringes. I have always wanted to celebrate the

The shows are themed each year, the inspiration for which can come from everywhere and anywhere, Nell says. From War and Peace to Treasure Island, references and influences have been broad and far-reaching, but topical? That's something she is keen to keep away from. "I hate anything in the show that references anything contemporary, Brexit or anything. It's just like get in that tent and just forget about the year, everything, total escapism"

Giffords Circus began in 2000, with a small show at Hay-on-Wye Literature Festival. "I had been working in the circus for quite a few years and I wrote a book about it [Josser: The Secret Life of a Circus Girl]. They asked me to talk about the book, so I brought a circus along, and the rest is history," she remembers.

Toti, who runs a landscaping business, found the wagon in a hedge in Cheltenham, did it up, and that was the first of the now famous maroon and gold velvet-lined circus wagons that tour around the country each summer, from May until September. There were around 20 performers in the first show. "My brother in law came along and he had a motorbike and rode that round the ring. My other brother in law Joe is an Irish folk musician, really good guitar and vocalist, he came along, so we've always had horses and live music." The circus

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now has a cult following, and has since entertained more than 650,000 people.

Her advice to her younger self would be to "be more organised."- "I had to learn a lot of business skills along the way, which has been a steep learning curve. People don't really realise that." If you follow Giffords on Instagram (you should, its excellent wanderlust), you'll see that along with the beauty, fun and glamour, there's an awful lot of hard work involved. "Yeah, I mean it is," Nell agrees. "It's a lot of people and a lot of concentration. I think people enjoy seeing the process, it's fun to see something being made. This area seems to really celebrate that actually."

All the animals are trained by the team, sets are painted in the barns on the farm, the costumes are handmade and are so real looking that they once had complaints about using a "small bear" in the show. It was in fact, just a very good costume.

Since 2012, the show has been directed by comedy director Cal McCrystal, whose credits include Paddington and One Man Two Guvnors.

Horses are central to the show, with everything from the overall theme to the colour scheme designed with the four-legged friends in mind. It is truly astounding what these majestic animals can do in what is a relatively small space. "It can take 10 years to train a horse to that level," Nell explains. There's Full House and High Card, shire horses, along with two little Eriskay ponies, Max and Percy, and not forgetting the dogs and chickens.

The circus moved from Bourton-on-the-Water to Fennells Farm in Stroud, in 2014. "It's just so nice and friendly round here," Nell smiles. "I grew up not far from here, so it definitely feels like home." Nell spends "a lot of time on Swifts Hill walking down to the Woolpack" and rates The Marshall Rooms. "I just think there's so much optimism in Stroud, people are determined to go at life in a really positive way, it's a really good-humoured place," she adds.

The tour ends in September, and I ask if Nell has time for a holiday. "Hopefully I'll have a break if I can afford it. I haven't had a holiday to be fair since 2014. I have had cancer twice, I've been having treatment on and off for three years, so you can't really travel."

Nell has been open about her treatment for breast cancer, updating Giffords fans on her blog. It is refreshing, I say, hearing someone talk openly about it. "Thank you. You'd be surprised, a few people have said, 'oh stop talking about





your cancer' I just think the more we talk about it, the better. It's different for everybody of course, but it is not always the end of the world, cancer, it isn't."

On top of all the above, Nell also has eight-year-old twins Cecil and Red. "They enjoy the circus, they get involved in practise and everything. My daughter is good at organising," she says. Would she encourage them to follow in her theatrical footsteps? "It often happens that you want to put your own ideas onto your children, that you yourself might have wanted to be or do, and I don't really see much wrong with that, but obviously it's their life and they've got to find their own path. The circus is a great place to get a grounding in a creative life, meeting all different kinds of people of all different nationalities."

The first few shows take place in Stroud, before the show goes on tour to Sudeley Castle, Daylesford, Blenheim Palace, Oxford University, Chiswick House, Windsor Park, Stonor Park in Henley-on-Thames, Barrington, Frampton-on-Severn, Minchinhampton, Marlborough and



Stratton Meadows in Cirencester, before returning to Fennells Farm. "The first few shows are previews in a way because it's a local audience. By the end of the first weekend you'll have done the show nine times in three days, we do a lot of fine tuning then. In fact, it all happens then. You rehearse and rehearse, then it all kind of locks together when you've got the gudience." Nell explains, "On the last night everything runs like clockwork, but the first night has this energy and innocence I think. It takes until the halfway point then you know the show vou've act."

She says she can't pick a favourite location – "I love them all" – but does name Minchinhampton
Common and "the London shows" as particular highlights. Her teaser for this year is that it will "be beautiful.
There's red velvet, there's a new band in black tie, it is going to be really lovely."

I can't wait.

My Beautiful Circus launches in Stroud at Fennells Farm from the 4th to the 14th May. You can also catch



them at Sudeley Castle, Winchcombe (17th - 21st May), Daylesford Organic Farm, Kingham (24th May - 4th June), Blenheim Palace, Oxfordshire (7th - 11th June), Oxford University Parks, Oxford (14th – 25th June), Chiswick House & Gardens, London (28th June – 9th July) , Windsor Great Park (12th - 16th July), Stonor Park, Henley-on-Thames (19th - 23rd July), Barrington, Burford (26th July - 6th Aug), Frampton on Severn, Village Green (9th – 13th Aug), Minchinhampton Common (16th - 28th Aug), Marlborough Common (31st Aug - 10th Sept) and Stratton Meadows, Cirencester(13th - 24th Sept). The tour returns to Fennell Farm for the last shows from 27th - 30th Sept.

Stroud Shakespeare Festival

Friends, Stroudies, countrymen,
lend me your ears: the Bard is coming
to town this summer...

Stroud Shakespeare Festival is a brand new open-air theatre extravaganza in the beautiful surroundings of the Museum in the Park, situated (fittingly enough) in Stratford Park. Over the course of three days, there will be a wide range of events to suit theatre-goers of all ages: not just performances of plays, but also workshops, live music, and opportunities to find out more about Shakespeare's work.

Festival Director Alan Mandel
Butler works at SGS College as part of
Five Valleys Productions, a company
that gives students a taste of the
realities of the theatre industry. For
him "Shakespeare can sometimes be
presented in a very dry way within the
school curriculum: it's very much about
how the plays are analysed. Whereas
for me the real joy of Shakespeare is
being able to live it, breathe it and see
it. That's what it was designed for."

There are other Shakespeare festivals out there, of course. But part of what will make Stroud's different is the fact that the events are focused on a particular location, rather than being spread out around a town.

Then there's the way that Stroud Shakespeare Festival combines many different art forms. "Stroud and South Gloucestershire have so much wonderful art – not just performance art, but visual art too," says Alan. "There's so much happening, we wanted to bring that all into one location. It's not just

about putting on Shakespeare plays: it's about connecting with people who do performance poetry, with musicians, and with artists who are creating unique pieces specifically for the festival. It's playing to Stroud's strengths: the fact that for a small town, we have so much creative talent here." Art installations will include a Sonnet Tree: a full-size tree, with descriptions of how to write a sonnet, and the invitation to have a go yourself – writing couplets on luggage tags that you can tie to the tree.

As well as having ticketed performances of Shakespeare's plays, there will be a lot at the festival that's free: people can come along and be a part of it, even if they don't know anything about Shakespeare. And that includes kids: a major focus of the festival is on younger audiences who may have no connection with Shakespeare as yet – primary school children, and teenagers too. It's no accident that the festival takes place during half-term.

What Alan Mandel Butler is aiming for is something between a literary festival and music festivals such as Latitude or End of the Road, which have their big stage spaces, but then also have lots of little experiential things that happen around the edges. Another example he gives is Secret Cinema, which provides an immersive film experience, combining screenings with interactive performances in purpose-built sets. "As soon as you

step into the festival there will be loads of different things, with everything you see being linked in some way. But that's just as it was for the theatregoers of Shakespeare's time. It was an all-round experience: you went to see and be seen, you went to hear music and watch some dancing, or look at the beautifully painted canopy of the Globe. And just as it was in Shakespeare's day, this is for everyone: it's not pricey, it's not elitist."

Full performances will include Romeo and Juliet and Twelfth Night, while other productions are inspired by Shakespeare plays in a variety of ways, some of them quite unexpected. "One of the things that has excited me about the submissions that we've had - and that wasn't in the remit - is how many of the shows are about championing the women in Shakespeare, celebrating the female roles in the plays. Amazing female characters like Lady Macbeth and Desdemona: people are taking scenes or characters as their own inspiration. We also have improvised Shakespeare, which I'll be very interested in seeina."


The long-term vision is for Stroud Shakespeare to match the town's other wonderful festivals. "We don't want to step on anyone's toes," says Alan, "but we want to form part of the season of festivals that there is in Stroud, including the Stroud Film Festival and Stroud Fringe (which is supporting us). We're throwing Shakespeare into the mix. Though there are some

areat Shakespeare-related events around Gloucestershire (open-air performances at Berkeley Castle, for example), there isn't a Shakespeare festival in this area. But we're not just putting on traditional Shakespeare, we're trying to bring in a new audience, trying to bring something interesting and different to the plays. That's not to discount traditional Shakespeare: we have some wonderful traditional performances, but engaging with something new is really what we want to do. As time goes on, we want to be a place where people can try out something different."

Though the main performance spaces are now all spoken-for, Five Valleys Productions, the team who are putting the event together, are still open to proposals from emerging and established theatre performers, writing companies, dance companies and artists who produce work for children and families. They're also looking for volunteers to work in various roles, such as stewarding.

Stroud Shakespeare Festival will take place at the Museum in the Park, Stratford Park from 31 May to 2 June 2018. For a detailed listing or to contact Five Valleys Productions, visit stroudshakespearefestival.weebly.com
