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
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On a lovely summers early evening I wiggled my way down the side streets from Lower St. to meet Emily Barker and Lukas Drinkwater at their newly opened recording studio 'Everyone Sang'. Emily Barker is an award-winning singer-songwriter best known as the writer and performer of the theme to the hit BBC1 drama Wallander starring Kenneth Branagh. Lukas Drinkwater is a solo artist and session musician, half of Jacob & Drinkwater, a variously proportioned member of Emily's band, and a composer and multi-instrumentalist.

As I arrive at the studio, I'm welcomed outside by Lukas, and invited in for a cup of tea. Upon entering we hear Emily practicing her drumming skills (they are sounding good). Whilst sipping on my hot beverage, in this comforting and creative space, Emily informs me that the name of the studio comes from a poem by Siegfried Sassoon. I'm intrigued by this space, the three of us sit down nursing our teas and I want to find out more...

How did the studio come about?

Lukas (L): Well I had a studio by myself in Exeter, which I was using for my own session recordings. People would send in songs and I would add in my double bass parts, then I moved to Stroud, moved in with Emily, we needed a studio as our house is tiny, and we needed somewhere to store all the equipment, so we found this space...

Emily (E): ...and I had been looking for about five years for a studio space, and I wanted one nearby, then suddenly this property became available to rent when Lukas came to Stroud, it was very good timing!

As two established recording artists, what are the most important aspects in a studio for you?

L: For me it's about being in an environment where you feel encouraged and free to be yourself. A lot of studios I've been in can be intimidating and I think there are some people in the music industry who like to project that and be the bigger person.. It's important to have a space that is relaxed and cool and you feel happy and encouraged to work in, because that's how you get your best performance. Obviously the equipment is a large part of it and the people with the knowledge, probably the best difference is the vibe.

You've both been to lots of recording studios in your careers – have you had inspiration from those studios that you have brought into Everyone Sang?

E: Well the Shure SM7B Microphone we have here I used on my last album, which I made in Memphis recording

directly to tape, so that's a vision to have a more analogue feel.

L: It's picking out the things which are really cool and really awesome and sound great and also things that are viable – and try and find the middle ground in between, we are just trying to get the best we can get with the space and resources that we've got. We're quite a practical studio, but we have got some amazing ancient things lying around, old guitars and an 1860's pump harmonium, lovely things like

Who are you aiming the studio at, and Lukas, you were saying how you can also help out as an experienced session musician?

L: It's aimed at everyone and anyone really, the first few projects that happened here were with fairly new musicians. As the studio was just being set up it made sense for artists to do their first recordings here, because we as owners were doing our first recordings here – so we were sort of sussing it out together. Then we also have Dan Whitehouse booked in for a session who is an established singer/songwriter from Birmingham.

E: We just recorded an album with Marry Waterson. Marry and I wrote a bunch of songs together which we are releasing as a duo album next year. We met in Stroud at the Convent and Adem was also there on a songwriting retreat - so the three of us decided to make a record and we'd set up our studio here. So Marry and Adem came down, Lukas engineered, Adem produced - it just worked beautifully as a space.

L: And it's not just limited for people who can make it here, I spent a lot of time doing remote session recordings, as it's not easy to travel with a double bass. But with the advances in technology we can take on remote projects here. I've just finished producing an EP for Emily's brother in Australia - Cam Barker, we recorded his parts in Australia last year and

came back here and added extra layers in the studio.

For budding musicians out there and people interested in the industry, is there anything you can especially offer for them in this studio?

E: What Lukas is really great at is that many of the people who come along to record here are just beginning, so they don't really have a clear idea of what they want their song to sound like – so Lukas can sort of step in as producer, but also play all of the instruments, he can build it up with the people he is working with into making something they think sounds amazing. That is a unique quality that he can offer as an engineer and a musician.

Finally, what sort of feedback have you had from people that have recorded have?

L: Well so far everyone who has been here has loved it, just because it is such a nice cosy space to work in and it just doesn't feel overwhelming.

E: And from a point of view of a woman, this studio is very neutral.
I've been to a lot of studios in the past where I have felt that they were a very masculine space, and this studio is not that at all

L: It's particularly floral – it's a really warm, lovely comforting space, with cushions and throws, its peaceful, it doesn't have any of the pretenses. It's an all welcoming space, we try to make it inclusive.

E: And for somewhere like Stroud it's a great place for all the wonderful young musicians in the area...

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Given the choice of a velvet sofa, something resembling a reupholstered church pew and an austere looking set of dining room chairs, Dan opts for the humble wooden chairs. Positioned between the bookcase and the bar and under the watchful eye of lan Dury, I feel as if I should be asking Dan **Burner (mental health** nurse turned Chalfest festival director) who his influences are. Instead, Dan tells me about his real passion, the festival and the community it revolves around....

"I've always wanted to do an event of some description. I'm a Glastonbury baby basically. I'm not originally from Stroud, I'm from Cheltenham - I moved to London for 20 years, then came back here. So the music bug's always been there - I think the coming together is the bit I enjoy the most about it, people working together who wouldn't normally work together... that sense of community; what can heal [social division] those sorts of things are very important to me. So that's really why we do it, to do something we're proud of. To do it because I wanted to do it."

How have the community been involved?

From day one...the community that we live in, is actually a very vibrant one and the reason I moved back to Stroud. We are working with the youth club, all the free churches in the area doing the tea tent. Thomas Keble...

have taken on an out-of-curriculum sort of project, so they're designing all of the decor for the main bar, ironically they can't drink in it! There's an Alice in Wonderland theme. Ideally, going forward, could it be part of the school curriculum? It's the letting go and letting people do things, which is the bit I'm really enjoying; it's called the party on hill, it's just meant to be a day of letting go and of celebration.

Which acts are you most looking forward to this year?

The Secret Police, because I've been told by everyone they're great to see and I haven't seen them. I'm really looking forward to Basement Jaxx, because I just love my dance music. It would be impossible not to enjoy The Proclaimers. Then there are local bands that I missed last time: I fancy catching the Bob Porter Project, a guy who has been helping us out loads. The Dry Seamen, fortunately, who I did get to see last year; again, brilliant musicians - sort of a cross between lan Dury and Madness. DJ Jamie Rainbow will be playing our silent disco and doing a mixing demo for teenagers as well, he's really up for that. Thing is with Stroud, you only have to throw a stone and you'll hit a musician...

So how did you lock down the line up?

There are some really clever people in the village, so we've got a top guy who takes care of the bigger bands and he's a music agent. Plus just be nice to people! We are trying to look to the future, trying to get some up and coming bands [for Chalfest's Got Talent] I don't know if you know a local band called Bones Like That, they're 16 years old - this sort of post-punk band, I've just fallen in love with what they do - they've aot a real sense of energy about them. I would happily put anything on, there's just so much good stuff out there. If we get a band that are really good, like a proper band, whatever it might be and we think, do you know what, we'll put them on before the Proclaimers or something that's how it should be.

What would you like people to take away from the festival?

Whenever I come away from Glastonbury or another event, even just a aia, vou just want to be a bit nicer to people, you're bit happier with yourself, the world, what have you - that's the sort of thing I want people to take away from it. We have people who have lived in the same village as their mates for the last 30 years - haven't seen them since school, but they've bumped into each other at the festival and started up the friendship again. I think the thing that works well about it is it does appeal to everyone, it works in the community that we live in. Lots of people go home - get a cup of tea, what have you - go have a snooze, which I know someone did [last year] - there was one elderly lady, she came back 3 times - went home for a little snooze in-between, which was brilliant and she was rocking away to Fun Lovin' Criminals!

...and will your children be coming to the festival?

Oh yes, they're all helping! But tell me about what you're up to?

I do a bit of writing, I'm an opera singer...

So we need some classical music at Chalfest then!

Do you

Well...why not! Another thing to add in, it would work. Obviously at Glastonbury you've got a theatre and a circus cabaret ... you can't do everything, you can't shrink Glastonbury into one field, I know that. But we could one year, have a slant on something [comedy or literature] I'm not sure comedy works in daylight though...

Was there a particular moment when you thought 'I want to do this'?

What had happened was, my children went to a school in Chalford hill - the PTA private do, which was called 'a band in the barn', a huge fundraiser, went really well - 350 people; and then we started talking about the fundraiser next year being more of a festival kind of thing - a one day or a few hours event - and I went 'well that's just keeping it to one school, why

don't you do it for the whole area, see where this goes' - and everyone sort of threw ideas in and that's probably the moment where we all went, OK let's give this a go. And at each point at that stage I thought 'I'll ask the parish council and they'll say no' and they said yes, so I thought OK I'll apply for the licence from Stroud council and they'll object and no one did; and each time you're sort of running out of excuses - and you approach a few bands and the pillars of the community, so you go to the churches for example and you say 'are you up for this?' and they go yeah and you speak to the schools, and they all get involved. This time last year, I was nervous as hell, I didn't know how it was going to go and what have you. But there's so much good feeling about it this time. What I might do this year is hold a competition for people to guess how many steps I do on the day, I might wear a fitbit or something. It was really odd at the end because it cleared really quickly... the chip shop stayed open for the first time in its history and they made an absolute killing...the buses all ran like clockwork and by quarter past ten there were four of us stood in a field, going 'that just happened'...

Chalfest returns for its second year Saturday 21st July at France Lynch Pleasure Ground ft. over 40 artists performing across five stages including a DJ set from headliners Basement Jaxx, the Proclaimers, Dick and Dom (back by popular demand!), Ardyn, Tankus the Henge and the Stroud Fringe Choir plus workshops, games & activities for kids, circus skills, forest school, street food trucks and aourmet treats and lots of refreshing craft beer & cider...General tickets are unfortunately now sold out but a select few still available for residents of Chalford! Stroud acred Music **Festival**

Now in its fourth year, Stroud's very own festival of sacred music continues to expand and evolve while keeping community at its heart. Each year the festival committee consciously take a few small steps to develop the event in a sustainable away that allows it to stay true to its intentions.



The organisers are already rightly proud of this year's event, which features an impressive lineup of local. national and international artists from a wide range of sacred music traditions. "The programme this year is the best we have ever managed in terms of diversity and experience for the audience." The 2018 programme will feature three notable additions, all designed to make it as diverse, inclusive and uplifting an experience as possible.

On the Friday night the young people of Stroud take the lead and will be hosting a Youth Stage - with a headline performance from well-known roots reggae artist Natty. The young people were given full creative license to put their evening together and took on the responsibility for dealing with contracts and negotiations, supported and mentored by the core team of the festival and other local facilitators. Festival organiser Sarah Frazer says "We are bowled over with what they have come up with. It's their music, their innovation. They have secured some fantastic local talent and they wanted a great headliner to top it off. They managed to secure Natty by themselves. I think he was really touched by them. The young people work in their own way - rather than having meetings it was all done in Messenger. They have shown in bucketloads that they are able to be creative, responsible and learn quickly."

On Saturday, another new addition to festival will see the Old Town Hall hosting a full day of multi-faith chanting from a broad spectrum of traditions. Suitable for all ages, the day of chanting will culminate with a multi-faith choir performance to open the main concert programme which begins later that night.

The festival will open at 11am on Saturday on the steps of the Subscription Rooms, where a band of sacred drums and singing will invite the people of Stroud to join them in a procession through town to the churchyard, where they will be greeted by a dynamic fusion of shamanic drumming and the pealing of the church bells.

The headliner for the event this year will be Syrian artist Maya Youssef who views the act of playing music as "the opposite of death... a life and hope affirming act." Her album 'Svrian Dreams' was created as a means to express and come to terms with the intense feelings groused by the war in her homeland and has been widely acclaimed for its exquisite, emotional soundscapes and original jazzy twist on Arabic chamber music.

Putting together a festival of such scope and scale as this one takes a tremendous amount of logistical effort from a committed team all pulling together. However the organisers are keen to express that their main focus is not on the festival as a spectacle, but on creating a community around open-hearted communication. "Where

words let us down, music and the arts transcend. This event is an act of peace. Finding points of connection is sometimes easier through the arts than through word".

What is quite exceptional about the event this year is that, not only is it run entirely by volunteers but the team are really stepping out in faith and making this year's festival a "by donation" event instead of selling tickets at a fixed price. There will be a suggested donation of between £10 and £50 per person relative to your means, however we are assured that absolutely nobody will be turned away.

They are also working alongside GARAS (Gloucestershire Action for Refugees and Asylum Seekers) to arrange transport for people from around the county to attend the event, so your donations will help others to attend who may not otherwise be able.

Alongside the spirit of inclusion. generosity and faith that underpins the festival, there exists at the same time a clear commitment to pay the artists properly for their performance. The organisers recognise and honour the livelihoods of the creatives who really are at the heart of the whole event. Without them there would be no festival. They believe that creating security and value for the artists allows them to really share their heart with audiences and achieve a deeper connection that uplifts all who come

While the performances find their origin in the music of diverse sacred

traditions, I share the belief that when it comes from an open heart - all creative expression points us back toward a common root. As a person who does not belong to any one spiritual tradition, I can recall precious moments of shared understanding and heartfelt connection that came about through the experience of sacred music. Sitting among a gathering of Sufis in Turkey and sharing blissful smiles and companionship, supporting a festival performance which saw hundreds of sparkly young things in wellies swaying to the soft chanting of Beyonce lyrics with a full Indian mantra band in accompaniment and being moved to tears by a medieval choir performing in a modern Catholic church in Kensington. I am looking forward to many more such moments throughout this event!

The programme for this year's Stroud Sacred Music Festival has something for all ages and spiritual or nonspiritual inclinations. For full details and timinas see the website sacredmusicfestival. org.uk and keep an eye on social media for further announcements and additions.



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

Sitting in a beer garden chatting to John Dougherty, I get the sense of a man who is at ease with himself and proud of the role he plays as an award-winning children's author.

John is the recent recipient of Oscar's Book Prize, set up in memory of Oscar Ashton who died suddenly and unexpectedly aged just 3½ years old. He loved books and loved to be read to, so his mum and dad decided to create this prize in his memory. John, and illustrator Laura Hughes, were invited to St James' Palace in London in May and were delighted when Princess Eugenie opened the envelope to announce that the winner was their picture book, There's a Pig Up My Nose.

Speaking about the prize, John explained that the criteria included the book being something that parents will enjoy reading as much as children enjoy hearing. There comes a time when there is one book that has to be read every night, no adaptations, no abbreviations and certainly no omissions - a scenario I'm sure every parent recognises! This is a perfectly normal and important developmental stage in a child's reading life. However, if the book that becomes the chosen one is dull, then life can become pretty tough for parents! His job, therefore, is to write books that work for adult and child alike and There's a Pig Up My Nose does just that.

John originally trained as a teacher. As a young student, he had a week pre-training at his local primary school. The Deputy Head gave him an important lesson – if you're going to teach young children, you need to read children's books and so he was given a reading list any 6 year old would be proud of! This homework reminded John just how good children's literature could be and a seed was planted.

Like all good writers, John looks to his surroundings for inspiration. As a teacher, those inspirations were in front of him daily. The young girl, Suganthi, whose snorting laugh prompted John to ask her if she had a pig up her nose (and the rest is history) had a classmate who we'll call Mark (mainly because that's his name!) Mark was one of those kids who was never quite "present" in a room. However, John discovered that there was much more to him out of school, A story developed about a boy whose brain was too big to fit inside his head, so when he came to school he left his brain at home! Mark was the hero and he loved it. Being part of the story changed his classroom persona and brought him out of himself. The power of a good story writ large.

As a supply teacher for 8 years, John had a big "toolkit" of lessons he brought out when stepping in to cover for an absent teacher. The kids, I suspect, loved it when Mr Dougherty came in with his stories, his guitar and his shirts. As "experts" continued to change the way education was delivered, this tool kit became less practical and JD became a bit less inspired. A move out of the Big Smoke

to Stroud prompted a choice – continue trying to get supply work or take the leap of faith and become a full-time writer and stay at home dad. Writing won, and are we glad it did!

John's children provided the characters for his very successful series of books Stinkbomb and Ketchup Face, charming monikers created by the kids for each other. He is rightly proud of this series and believes that they are true surrealism - a realisation that came from a review of them being placed next to a piece defining "surrealism" in The Times. Surrealists think in the same way children play games - there are rules but they aren't necessarily known to anyone other than the participants and are quite fluid. The 5th book of this series The Great Big Story (K) Nickers is now up for another award – watch this space!

I mentioned the shirts and guitar earlier. Anyone who knows John, will know that he is usually resplendent in a flowery shirt from a pretty extensive collection. These have become something by which he is widely recognised - "you know John; guitar and shirts". Children's writers, he assures me, must work harder at book events than their "adult" colleagues. No sitting back in an armchair sipping a fizzy water answering gently probing questions. They're up there in front of the hardest of audiences telling stories, singing songs and working that crowd. A flowery shirt seems to break the ice...


Songs are an integral part of John's show and many of his books have

a theme song. The law, he tells his audiences, says an author must sing this song before starting the story. A law, it seems, that many of his colleagues are unaware of, at least until they follow JD into a school or festival only to be asked to sing the song first!

I asked John about messages or morals in his books. He explained that children will see a mile off when they are being preached at, but that it is inevitable that the writer's values will come through in a story. He firmly believes, though, that his books are essentially entertainment. If a child reads and laughs at one of his books and wants to read another, then another, John sees his work as being worthwhile. And who could argue with that?

There's a Pig Up My Nose is out now via Egmont Publishing. John will be at the Stroud Bookshop on Sat 30th June at 11am signing copies of the book and at this year's Stroud Children's Festival at the Museum in the Park on Saturday 7th July. Eve Coy is the kind of person that you instantly warm to. Her illustrations are full of energy and wit. Her emails have a skipping illustration in the signature. Both make me smile.

Originally working in animation, as an animator and story artist, Eve started an MA in Children's Books after having her daughters. Her drawings encompass family life, Gloucestershire, and cats.

Eve's style has a fun sense of movement and brings us the reality of a family at home. The rosy red cheeks and smiles of her characters make her pictures comforting and cosy. She works traditionally with watercolour, gouache paint, and colouring pencils. Her working day, at Prema Arts Centre in Uley, where she has a studio and recently held an exhibition of her work, begins with the school drop-off but can go on late into the night.

She tells me about the process of creating illustrations. She begins by working on very small drawings, which she finds makes her drawing looser and allows her to experiment with different versions of the same scene. They are then scanned in ready to create a rough plan of the layout. She tells me that she doesn't really like working on the computer, although she often finds herself tweaking colours and making fixes in Photoshop.

Eve believes that art is a passion and part of who you are. Working many jobs, including as a cleaner,

bookshop staff member, and waitress, didn't stop her from progressing into animation. Using her holiday entitlement to do work experience at animation studios, she eventually landed her big break with a job at Aardman, the studio famous for Wallace and Gromit and Shaun the Sheep.

Of her time in animation, Eve says: "This work was incredibly rewarding in that it taught me to draw constantly and not get too precious about my work. I was also lucky enough to work with some fantastic artists who were really inspiring. When I had children, the animation industry become a tricky career path to pursue due to the freelance nature of the work which inevitably doesn't fit around childcare."

The time at home reading "endless books" to her children made Eve curious about the work of illustration. She found herself studying how the artists told stories through pictures and the layout of the books. Inspired by the work of artists such as Emily Gravett, Polly Dunbar, Joel Stewart and Rebecca Cobb, she began her studies in Cambridge.

Her first book, Looking After William, began to take shape whilst she was studying and was later picked up

by Andersen Press at an exhibition. It tells the story of William and his "Mummy", although we soon learn that the roles have been reversed in this heart-warming tale. Whilst the words tell us one story, the illustrations tell us another. Eve was inspired by her husband and his role as a father: "My husband, Will, is a very talented director in animation. When we had kids, the original plan was that we would both take it in turns working or parenting as we were both freelance and could alternate project by project. However, once I was at home and became the primary carer it became evident that this wasn't going to work. I really loved being a mum, but I also really missed drawing for a living and the career that I'd worked hard to establish. Will was very supportive and encouraged me to do the MA which resulted in me getting my first publishing contract for this book. He is a fantastic dad and a lovely fellow, so it seemed appropriate to have him in a story about a great dad." Of course, this also had the added benefit that he was regularly available for Eve to draw.

Eve's favourite illustrations, however, are of her daughters: "I guess my favourite pieces are ones that I have just done for myself. They... remind me of them and make me giggle. One shows my daughter demonstrating how to sit on a chair. The other image shows my eldest sporting an eighties wig in her PJs, because, why wouldn't you?"

Reflecting that she is "still very new to the industry", Eve says that her advice for aspiring illustrators is not to give up. "Persistence and wanting to progress are definitely important. I also feel that talent is much more about grit and hard work than any particular gift." She also advocates for gaining inspiration from those around you. "I'm inspired by so many artists. I'm still a huge fan of the artists that I previously mentioned but I also love the work of Lizbeth Zwerger, Isabelle Arsenault, Carson Ellis, Lizzy Stewart and the animator Joanna Quinn. My husband is also pretty brilliant. I am contractually obliged to add that."



After finishing Looking after William, Eve illustrated Who's Going to Bed? by Abie Longstaff, which is due to be published


in 2019. Eve's new book, which has the intriguing working title of The Huffalots, is another collaboration with Andersen Press and will also be on shelves in 2019. We're sure to be in for some surprises as Eve was unable to tell us any more about the book!

Margaret Hills:

Stroud's Secret Suffragist

It's 8:30am on a Saturday morning and I'm stood in the Blue Room of Stroud's Centre for Science and Art looking at the history, in timeline form, of a woman whose impact on Stroud is truly astonishing, but whose name — I'm ashamed to say — I've never even heard of. That is, until a week previously when I was first introduced to Jacqui Stearn...

"It's easy to forget and I forgot – or indeed I didn't know – the backstory to why we've got the vote," says Jacqui, after I ask her why former councillor and suffragist Margaret Hills is so significant to our town's history. "I think it's important to notice just whose shoulders we're standing on, just whose feet we're treading in and the other bit for me is that she was a local councillor and I think the work of our local councillors is not understood.

Celebrating Margaret Hills is exactly what Jacqui plans to do and, based on the research of expert local historian Cllr Chas Townley and with funding from the Government Equalities Office, a unique one-woman performance titled Stroud's Secret Suffragist will take place on the streets of Stroud on Saturday 14th July. But who is Margaret Hills and why do we, as a community, know so little about her?

appreciated and celebrated."

Originally from London, Margaret became the first woman to be elected to Stroud Urban District Council in 1928. She was involved in the purchasina of Stratford Park as a public space, the slum clearance around Middle Hill and the erection of social housing in Summer Street. Before she arrived in Stroud in 1922, Margaret was one of only three people to be employed by the National Union of Women's Suffrage Societies and had spoken passionately about women's suffraae at numerous public debates. "Those women [suffragists] were campaigning about way more than the vote," says

Jacqui, "they were campaigning about birth control, wages, the conditions of childbirth. They were campaigning about everything to do with our everyday lives that we are nowadays concerned about as well..."

Perhaps that is why it's so important that in the centenary year of some women receiving the right to vote (and ninety years since women gained eaual voting rights with men), the story of a woman who fought so diligently for matters that are still relevant to women today should be shared on a wider scale. Perhaps that is also why so many of the people involved in the Margaret Hills celebrations (there's also the Museum in the Park Garden Party in celebration of National Democracy Week on July 1st) are as passionate as lacqui about bringing Margaret's work to the forefront of public consciousness. "As a vouna person who values equality and the suffrage movement, I was really excited to learn about a strong female defying society's restriction and achieving greatness," says local filmmaker, River DriverSharp whose short documentary film, based on Chas and Jacqui's timeline, will also explore how Margaret's story has inspired people in contemporary society. "From learning of how much her legacy has influenced the town as we know it today, I want to teach many more people like me about the previously unknown Margaret Hills."

Liz Terry has also found Margaret's story to be a great source of

inspiration, this time from a musical perspective: "We celebrated her during our International Women's Day event this March with She Sings and Nia Moves where over 200 women gathered to learn songs and then sing and dance through the streets of Stroud." After seeing Chas and Jacqui's timeline, Liz wrote Brave Woman, a song she woke up with at 4am and one She Sings now perform and hope to record. "I find it very inspiring learning about how women in positions of leadership can bring lasting positive change to their communities."

Portraying this inspirational woman at both the Museum in the Park on July 1st and at the July 14th street performance is professional actor Kim Baker and although Kim is delighted to be taking on such an exciting role ("I said I'd love to play her. It's a real privilege..."), she's also aware that knowing so little about the kind of woman Margaret was on an emotional level will bring with it its own challenges: "What I would really love is to hear a recording of her voice or to see footage or read her diaries, all those things we don't have...I'd like to know what her mannerisms were, what her temperament was like...I think she had a lot of dignity, a lot of integrity. She was obviously a very eloquent speaker, but she loved working with working class people, men and women, so that's where the heart of her is and that's what I've got to go on."

It's clear that considerable efforts have been made to ensure that the

performance event perfectly echoes the life of Margaret Hills. The locations used – including Rowcroft and Park Gardens – hold a particular relevance to Margaret's history and the handmade woollen missiles that Jacqui has made in suffragist colours are a symbol of the stones and rotten eggs that were thrown during the Great Pilgrimage of 1913.

From an entertainment perspective, this performance is one to mark on your calendar, but from a historical standpoint, one that reflects the history of our small town and honours the impact that one woman had on the place it is today, it's an absolute must-see.

Stroud's Secret Suffragist will start at 1:30pm on Saturday 14th July at the Shambles by the post box. It will then travel to the Subscription Rooms, Rowcroft/Lloyd's Bank and Park Gardens, culminating in a workshop at the Centre for Science and Art on Lansdown. Penelope Kirk

Fine artist and textile designer, Penel (Penelope) Kirk has worked and travelled internationally for most of her adult life, but her latest series of paintings bring her back to a time of childhood innocence, growing up in the spectacular grounds of Stowe School in Buckinghamshire. As an 80's fashion graduate from Central Saint Martins, her design work took her from London to India, New York, Hong Kong and finally Melbourne where she set up a studio designing collections for swimwear brand Rip Curl, amongst others. This colourful Aussie life was a million miles from the bygone era of Stowe aristocrats and the 'finest gardens in England' rivalling even the royal gardens of Europe.

There can be few other landscapes as iconic as Stowe Landscape Gardens, bursting with Baroque and Palladian temples, lakes, cascades, lawns, grottos, canals, pyramids, obelisks and tree lined avenues leading to the ostentatious Stowe House, the grandest temple of them all, designed in a commanding classical style. It is the memories of these vistas and landscapes that have stayed with Penel all her life, and which she is now voraciously painting.

It is this heady mixture of architectural lines and natural planting that inspires Penel's work. There is both strength and fragility in each piece. They recall a time of youth and innocence, of sunny days idling away hours in the company of Shakespeare, Sir Walter Raleigh, Homer and Socrates – no matter that they were 18th century statues! "It feels like I've found my signature style.... like I've been somehow formulating these

paintings for years," she insists, without any hesitation, "the reaction to my work has been amazing."

Penel and her family moved to

Stowe in 1963 when her father was appointed Housemaster of Walpole. One of his famous alumni, Richard Branson, will have surely benefited

from his attentive careers advice! Her mother was a matron and art teacher - both were busy working parents, leaving their children to freely roam the grounds. Penel remembers these as halcyon years, an enormous playground for her and best friend Rebecca to explore, eating picnics at the Temple of British Worthies. sneaking into the school shop during the holidays and their favourite spot, The Palladium Bridge, supposedly haunted by The Grey Lady. The girls cycled everywhere, through the woods to the stables, to the Grecian Valley and the Elysian fields - the names alone conjure an English idyll. "When we lived there, many of the monuments were overgrown and in desperate need of repair. I remember a wilder Stowe with a magical air of decay and a fairy tale like quality, which I've tried to portray in my paintings."

The techniques she uses are central in creating the 'dream like' effect

that has become her signature style. Pencil drawings are carefully plotted onto a washed and dripped oil base layer, then more layers and textures are gradually added, splodges of oils, metallics, dripped turps, palette knife mark making. It's a time consuming process, not least because of the drying time. But the finished paintings are a clever mix of strong architectural lines and romantic visions. Her pencil drawings are no less dramatic and she makes best use of liquid graphite, moving it around, spraying and adding water over intricately drawn originals. "That's the exciting part – mistakes can happen!"

Her riverside studio in the heart of Chalford has a reassuring air of turpentine and glass cabinets are filled with varnishes and primers, "I love painting in here, especially in the Summer months. What I really like about my work is that there's plenty to look at – there is texture, marks, #40 | July 2018 Art 17

sometimes poems. You have to really look closely." She is referring to the many monuments with political and social inscriptions that were popular at the time, one in particular dedicated to his faithful hound 'Signor Fido'.

Each vista and monument she depicts is iconic. The Oxford Bridge, designed by Earl Temple features eight decorative urns on each parapet and is a firm favourite with old Stoics. Even a luddite couldn't fail to be mesmerised by these scenes created by the most talented architects and garden designers of the age, the two most feted being Capability Brown and William Kent (his photograph in the National Trust guidebook depicts him in a rakish red velvet turban, such were the fashions of the time!) Her paintings are bought by not only old Stoics, but garden lovers, those with a connection to the place and to the special architectural landscapes.

What was it like to grow up in such palatial surroundings? "The view from The South Front down to the Octagonal Lake and beyond is a very strong memory. I remember taking the school bus from Boycott Pavilions, nicknamed The Pepperpots, to Chackmore Primary School. We spied on the Stowe boys as there were so many places to hide. We didn't really appreciate how lucky we were."

Penel muses on her latest commission, 'The Rotunda' a heady mix of deep teal and heavily layered gold oil paint. Peeping out from beneath the rotunda is the Medici Venus, also known as the 'Cypriot Queen' - the Goddess of Sex. Designed in 1720, this life size gold statue still reflects the sun and shines brightly. As with all her paintings, Penel has captured this ancient creature in a very modern light.

To see her work, head to penelfineart.com. Original oil paintings are available to purchase from her website. She welcomes visitors to her studio by prior appointment.

Fine Art Prints of all her paintings are available from Steve Russell Gallery (steverussellgallery.com). These prints are limited editions of twenty five and prices start at £90. They are beautifully printed on Hahnemuhle paper using archival inks embossed with an authentication seal to ensure quality.






